What They're Reading

Those of you who still have hopes of inspiring in a literary or artistic way your children, grandchildren, pupils, or young friends, might do well to invest in, or borrow from the library, some of the books by Hendrik Van Loon.

While watching the movie, "Rembrandt," I kept feeling that the flair with which the play was presented must have been inspired by Mr. Van Loon's life of that brilliant artist. So I have been re-reading some of the books that Van Loon has written for children, books which seem to me so inspiring for people of all ages.

Way back 20 years ago he published that delightful volume, "A Short History of Discovery," a book of 126 pages, with a very readable account of a different discovery or "founding" on each page; and on the opposite page, an illustration in color. A thrilling book with which to begin one's history of the world!

Then came that marvelous book, "The Story of Mankind," with over 100 illustrations. At first published at five dollars, it has long been available in a one dollar edition. Two years later came "The Story of the Bible," with its scholarly and liberal viewpoint and such fascinating illustrations. It also was first published at five dollars and then reprinted in the same form at one dollar.

Then two years ago Dr. Van Loon (yes, he's a doctor of philosophy, and has been a college professor at distinguished colleges) published a delightful little book, "Around the World With the Alphabet." A page for each letter from "A is for Athens" to "Z is for Zermatt" with a full page illustration in color of each place described.

Last year came the second volume in this new series, "The Songs We Sing." There are 25 simple songs with simple accompaniments and, of course, the full page colored illustrations.

Of these new books, Dr. Van Loon writes: "Now what was in my mind when I started the 'A B C' was something like this. Our children's books, by and large, are not at all what they should be. A great many of them happen to be bound copies of our so-called 'Sunday Comics.' I might as well confess that, together with many millions of my neighbors, I regard the average Sunday supplement comic as the most pernicious artistic, literary and ethical pabulum that could possibly be fed to our younger generation."

DELICIOUS MERGER! SP-ICED TEA AND ICE CREAM!



SUGAR, n' spice, and all things nice, are certainly responsible for the inimitable flavor of this Orange Pekoe Ice Cream; but much of the credit for its velvety-smoothness and easy-to-makeness must go to the modern ice cream freezer. And the credit for having on hand a ready supply of ice goes to the modern ice refrigerator which now needs to be re-iced only every 4 to 7 days. To make this Orange Pekoe Ice Cream the agitated way, pour 1 cup boiling water over 3 tablespoons orange pekoe tea, 6 cloves, 1½ cups sugar, ½ teaspoon salt. Cover, and steep for 3 minutes. Strain and pour the warm liquid slowly over 2 beaten egg yolks, stirring thoroughly. Cook, stirring constantly, for about 2 minutes. Cool. Add ¾ cup orange juice, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, ½ teaspoon grated lemon rind and 3 cups coffee cream. Fold in 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten. Pour mixture into freezing container of modern ice cream freezer. Then pack a mixture of 3 parts crushed ice to 1 part rock salt around freezing container. Freeze until turning becomes difficult—about 5 minutes. Take out dasher and pack down evenly with a spoon. Cover ice cream with wax paper. Repack. Cover and allow to harden at least 1 hour.

For those of us who agree with these sentiments, I don't know any better way of helping the movement for finer books for the children than supplying them with some of these fascinating volumes written and illustrated by Hendrik Van Loon.

Drivers Urged To Sign AAA Safety Pledge

Take the Oregon Motorists' safety pledge!

This call was sent throughout the state this week by leaders of the 1937 "Let's Quit Killing" safety program, who have made available to all motorists an attractive red, white and blue sticker, on the back of which is a pledge to drive safely.

Endorsed by Earl Snell, secretary of state, and Mayor Joseph K. Carson Jr., of Portland, the stickers are available at the office of this newspaper, the chamber of commerce, or at establishments displaying the AAA sign here. A supply of the stickers was received by the Sun this week and any driver may receive one at the Sun office.

The pledge sticker, issued from the offices of the Oregon State Motor Association, is based on experience which has shown that the man pledging himself to safe driving is the one

who most generally observes all the rules of safety and proves an asset rather than a hazard on Oregon's streets and highways.

Every motorist interested in helping reduce the traffic toll should ally himself with the existing safety program by signing the pledge and attaching it to his car, the automobile club urged.

The pledge is as follows: "With the knowledge that it is my clear-cut duty to conserve life and prevent suffering and injury with every means in my power, I hereby agree:

"That I will drive carefully at all times, keeping hands on wheel, eyes on road, mind on driving.

"That I will learn, respect and obey the rules of safety."

"It is a fine thing to go through life with a smile on your face, but your big job is to say something or do something that will ease the other fellow's burden so that he, too, will smile."

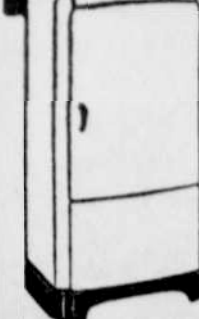
