

Bids Asked by Government For New Road

The construction of a new highway approach to the Hood River-White Salmon Bridge took a step forward last week when the Government released specifications and opened bidding on the project. Bids will be opened at 3 P. M., October 7.

Construction will be two-fold in purpose: (1) To provide a graded and a rock-surfaced highway connection from the Columbia River Highway to the bridge and to an industrial area situated between the Union Pacific Railway and the old bridge approach; (2) To construct levees which will protect the industrial area, composed of the Richfield Oil Company plant, the Tum-a-lum Company fuel yard, and a storage warehouse, from new high water levels induced by Bonneville Dam.

The main embankment or north levee is to serve as both levee and highway, forming a line north of but parallel to the present approach. A second embankment to be erected east of the industrial flat will extend north from the high ground on which the railroad extends to a junction point with the north levee, forming a protective triangle. At the same time, the industrial land will be filled so that no portion of it lies lower than 80 feet above sea-level. Specifications call for the clearing

of six acres of land, including several shacks. The Government estimates that it will be necessary to excavate 100,000 cubic yards of earth, and to place 13,200 tons of loose rock riprap. The old approach will continue to be used at present, but later contractors will have to construct detours while finishing touches are being made on the project.

5000 Folders Distributed

Five thousand small folders telling facts and figures of the Bonneville Dam were distributed through the crowd gathered to hear the President's speech Tuesday morning at Bonneville. The purpose of the booklet was to call attention to the city of Cascade Locks, only four miles from the dam.

The souvenirs, printed through the compliments of the Dam Chronicle were folded Monday through the compliments of Miss Beth Manchester, Mrs. Ernie Manchester and Mrs. R. J. Wuner. Tuesday morning at 6:30 Miss Manchester picked up four Scouts from Troop 390 in Cascade Locks and transported them to Bonneville where they started to work.
