SCHOOL MAKES CANDY

Bids Asked On Hood River Sewage Pumps

Bids were asked by the Government this week for a sewage pump and bilge pump for the Mount Hood Railroad protective works now under construction. The raising of the water level of the Columbia and Hood Rivers will require a revision in the drainage system on railroad property.

The pumps are to be installed in a pump house located on the west bank of the Hood River near the Columbia River Highway Bridge. They will cost an estimated \$1500 to \$1800. Bids will be opened on November 10 at the district engineer's office at Bonneville.

Specifications state that the sewage pump shall have a capacity of 750 gallons per minute when pumping against a total maximum head of 26 feet, and a total minimum head of 17 feet. The pump shall be a horizontal, non-clogging sewage type, with not less than 5 inch discharge.

The bilge pump will be an automatic cellar drainer type, mounted on a base covering a pit, and will have a capacity of not less than 50 gallons per minute when pumping against a total of eight feet. The motor will have not less than ½ h. p. rating, and the pump discharge not less than one and one-quarter inches.

GOVERNMENT TO PROSECUTE BOGUS COLLECTORS

Criminal prosecution by the Department of Justice of bogus collectors of funds in connection with the Social Security Act's Old-Age Insurance program has been requested by the Social Security Board, according to advice received by James E. Peebles, Manager of the Portland field office.

The Board advised the Department of Justice that it has received information of several instances where money has been collected through such misrepresentation, and requested the Department to investigate them and institute criminal proceedings. In announcing its action the Board stated:

"The Social Security Board has no 'old-age benefit collectors,' 'old-age insurance collectors,' or any other kind of collectors or financial agents. It has authorized no one to collect any fees from participants in the old-age insurance program. We wish to caution everyone against making any payments whatever to persons representing themselves as agents of the Board and who guarantee the payment of old-age insurance."

"Wage earners who are entitled to lump-sum payments because they have reached age 65, and the estates of wage earners who have died this year, may secure at room 105 Old Post Office Building the simple claims forms and advice absolutely free," Peebles said.
