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## GLOVES TO MATCH YOUR SPRING SUIT

Cloth gloves to match spring suits are the latest news from Paris. An extra piece of material, ordered when the suit is bought, can be made up in any size or style, short or with deep gauntlet cuffs. Square fingertips are another innovation. The finger may be stitched at sides and straight across the top, giving a casual, out-of-doors look, especially popular in gloves of doeskin or chamois.

Half-finger gloves, which made their appearance last winter in the guise of lace mitts to go with gowns of the southern belle type, are now an established vogue. They are shown in pigskin and chamois for sports wear, and in suede for dress. The gloves extend as far as the finger-joint, revealing brightly polished nails. Very convenient when it comes to picking up a dropped coin, fitting a key or writing out a check. Polish in cardinal or burgundy may be worn to match or contrast with the gloves.

Further independence in glove fashions is exhibited in the unconventional treatment of seams along the back of the hand. These vary from two or three seams running across instead of up and down, to one crosswise seam with two short ones in the usual direction.

## "Muskingum," Old Indian Name for River, County

The name "Muskingum," for a county by that name in Ohio, also for a river well known in Ohio, came from the Delaware Indian word meaning Moose-eye river, so called because of the vast number of moose and elk which inhabited the valley. Some authorities claim they have traced the word back to the Indian Mooskingom or Elk's Eye, according to a writer in the Cleveland Plain Dealer.

In early times the Muskingum and Tuscarawas rivers and their valleys were known only as the Muskingum. When the pioneers came the name Tuscarawas was given to all that portion between the dividing ridges in Summit county and the town of Coshocton, where the Walhonding river joins the Tuscarawas to form the Muskingum.

The origin of the tricky name of Tuscarawa, which now represents a river, county, and village in the same county has long furnished historians a subject for research. According to some early writers, this often misspelled and mispronounced name was derived from the Tuscarora tribe of Indians, who originally inhabited North Carolina. They migrated to New York state to become part of the Six Nations Confederation. Afterwards some members of the tribe are said to have wandered west to the Ohio Valley, giving their name to the new hunting grounds. Then pioneers substituted the "a" for the "o" in the spelling of Tuscarawas, and gave the name to the river and the valley. Later the present spelling became most common.

Other chroniclers believe the word came from a Delaware Indian title which means "Old Town." They claim the river receives its name from Tuscarawa, the oldest Indian town in that section of the state and which was situated on the stream's bank.

Part of this knowledge is obtained in the class room from the study of books, but a great deal of it must come from actual practice of the principles and methods learned. For this purpose all Modern Chiropractic Colleges maintain a clinic where the student serves his internship.

Under the supervision of the instructors he must proceed with the diagnosis and treatment of patients. He must learn to perform the necessary laboratory procedures for diagnosis and interpret their meaning. In treatment he must, first of all, become proficient in adjusting the spine; then he must know what, if any, electrical machine or other modality to use in each case to supplement his adjustment, outline the proper diet, and instruct the patient as to exercises or other procedures that he may do to help his condition.
