**View of City
Obstructed by
Road Routing**

Travelers going north from the Mt. Hood Loop Highway or the Columbia River Highway via the White Salmon bridge will get little more than a fleeting glance of Hood River with the new routing of a road on the east side of Hood River stream. Bids will be received January 6 by U. S. District Engineers for a road from the junction of the Mt. Hood Loop and Columbia River highways to a point 400 feet north of the railroad track. An overhead crossing over the tracks of the Union Pacific Railroad will form a part of this road. The new roadway, running north from the Mt. Hood Loop junction will go behind the knoll and the view of Hood River will be obstructed to motorists.

The new contract will call for a drainage system which shall include a pump house.

The concrete protective wall under construction by Contractors Kern & Kibbe below the Mt. Hood Railroad tracks was nearing completion this week as forms were being removed on the 7-foot wall extending along the tracks just above the highway bridge. Foundations were being built for the pumping station below the bridge which will discharge waste from the industrial plants lo-

cated near the river's bank.

The Kern & Kibbe firm also hold a contract for work on the east side of the river which is now getting well under way according to Paul Spice, U. S. Engineer supervising the construction. The roadway connecting the Mt. Hood Loop road with the Hood River-White Salmon bridge is to be raised 15 feet from its present course along the river bottom, and dirt and rocks are now being put in place for the new roadbed.

**Local Mill Ranks

Recipes

Breaded Veal Chops

Place six lean veal chops in stew pan, add two slices of onion, four slices of carrot, four peppercorns and two cloves; cover with boiling water and simmer until tender.

Drain, dredge with seasoned flour; dip in beaten egg diluted with one tablespoon milk, cover with fine dry bread crumbs. Brown on both sides in hot fat, place on heated platter and surround with macaroni.

Hints**

Spots may be removed from felt hats by rubbing them with sandpaper.

When applying a new oilcloth cover for the square kitchen table put squares of adhesive tape as reinforcements on the under side where the cloth bends at the corners.

To wash chamois gloves add a few drops of olive oil to the water and that will keep them pliable and soft.

Use brown or blue paper when wrapping garments to be stored. The chloride of lime in white paper will destroy the color of the garment, causing it to yellow.

A strip of leather tacked on the wall above the kitchen table is handy for holding knives.

A greasy stove should be wiped with newspapers while still hot. Wash the stove with vinegar before polishing.
