

New Stickers Will Identify

New guest stickers which nonresident motorists will carry on their windshields while traveling in Oregon in 1938 have been printed and were available for use January 1st, Secretary of State Earl Snell has

The stickers, attractively reproduced in two colors, will accompany a triplicate form which not only is more economical than the former system of registration, but also will speed up work both in issuing stations and in the home office in Salem, Snell declared.

The "Guest of Oregon" idea, inaugurated by Secretary Snell a year ago, has proved popular and is being used in California also this year.

The 1938 Oregon stickers show a view of Crater Lake, with the nonresident registration blank printed on the reverse. During 1937 more than 150,000 out-of-state motorists will have registered to set a new all-time record, according to Snell.
