River Folk Slate Dam Celebration

The Mid-Columbia will celebrate completion of the Bonneville dam and opening of the ship lock at a banquet at The Dalles Wednesday, January 19, according to an announcement made by civic organizations sponsoring the event.

Colonel Thomas M. Robins, army engineer, and his staff have been invited to attend. Delegations from surrounding communities and representatives of river boat lines are also expected to be present.

The two river steamers now plying the upper Columbia, the Inland Chief and The Dalles, are scheduled to make an exhibition arrival at the new port terminal in the afternoon.

The boats will be open to inspection during the remainder of the day.

Mid-Columbia Chamber Officials Meet

With representation from practically every community on the Columbia River from Yakima to Portland, seven major committees on the Mid-Columbia Chamber of Commerce met last Friday afternoon and evening at the Columbia Gorge Hotel on the call of Roy Anthon, of Underwood, newly elected president.

The afternoon was spent in meetings of the various committees. In the evening the 70 members of the committees and the board of directors of the chamber gave their findings and reports at a banquet.

\$8,000,000 ASKED

\$923,000 is required for repairing North jetty, repairing dikes on Sand Island and sand fences on Clatsop spit.

For the Columbia and lower Willamette below Vancouver and Portland \$850,000 is required.

Included in this project will be dredging an auxiliary channel to Rainier and extending the turning basin at Vancouver.

For the Willamette above Portland, and the Yamhill river, \$124,000 is wanted. This is for dredging between Albany and Portland and snagging to Harrisburg, with dike repairs between Newberg and Independence and dredging Yamhill river.

Along the Oregon coast, dredging is the principal item. For dredging Coquille river, \$30,000; dredging north and south forks of Coos river, \$3000 is asked.

Heavy undertakings on the program of the engineers center in Coos bay, Yaquina bay and the Umqua.

To complete the south jetty at the mouth of the Umqua will require \$280,000, while restoration of the north jetty at Coos bay with dredging bar and channel calls for \$815,000.

At Yaquina bay the north jetty is to be extended 1000 feet seaward—an item of \$530,000—and dredging of bar and channel, while \$15,000 is rec-

ommended for dredging Yaquina river.

Depoe bay needs \$31,000 to complete the project there.

Engineers ask \$40,800 to dredge Skipanon channel and \$2000 for Young's bay and river.

Other items are: Westport slough, \$16,300; Clatskanie, \$6000; Multnomah, channel, \$10,000.

On the Washington side, \$2000 for Lake river between Ridgefield and the mouth; \$2000 for Lewis river between Woodland and La Center; for Cowlitz river, \$8000; Elokomon slough, \$16,000; Skamokawa creek, \$2000; Greys river, \$1000; Deep river, \$2400; Columbia river at Baker's bay, \$12,000.

Shipyard at The Dalles

Plans are under way at The Dalles for a shipyard with facilities for construction of barges and small river boats.

The port commission has leased a waterfront tract, 200 feet west of the port terminal, to C. T. Smith & Son for a 10-year period. Smith announced that he plans immediate expenditure of approximately \$14,000 for construction and equipment of the yard.

Dual Duties Imposed on Commission

The Federal Power Commission, in its annual report to Congress states, according to an Oregonian dispatch from Washington, that dual duties concerning the Bonneville project are imposed upon the commission, including the approval of rates and the determination of that part of the cost which should properly be allocated to power.

Rate schedules, the act provides, shall be based upon an allocation of costs to be made by the federal power commission, which way "allocate to the costs of electric facilities such a share of the cost of the facilities having joint value for the production of electric energy and other purposes as the power development may fairly bear as compared with such other purposes."

Although the commission has been gathering data for more than a year upon which to base the allocation, there is no information available at the FPC office as to when this allocation will be made, other than

members of the commission say "in the near future."

Until this allocation is promulgated the Bonneville administrator cannot establish a schedule of rates, and when this is done the schedule returns to the commission of approval or rejection.

The commission replies to the National Coal Association charge that 59,277,600 tons of coal will be "replaced" in the Pacific Northwest by hydroelectric plants, by declaring that only 78 tons of coal were consumed in generating electricity in steam plants of that area, which is a timber and not a coal country.

"sometime in February" when the water will be raised.

With the fish question out of the way, the engineers will concentrate on another feature of the dam, which many are deeply interested in—that is power. The two main generators are complete and ready for tests at the present time with the exception of the elaborate switch boards and some other essential accessories. These parts are under construction in the east at the present time and as soon as they arrive, the government will conduct extensive tests of the completed generators. During

these tests the water will be raised and lowered to check the reactions of the huge units at various heads.

The fourth duty of the dam is flood control. The Bonneville Dam will really be of service in this respect when at least three other dams have been completed on the Columbia.
