WORLD TOPICS Told in Brief

FOREIGN AFFAIRS

In Russia, the Central Committee adopted resolution calling for drastic curbing of the purge. Over 2000 persons executed because of "acts harmful to the state".

At St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, fire destroyed the Sacred Heart college in below zero weather. Seventeen perished—priests and children; 27 are unaccounted for.

In Shanghai, it is reported the Japanese ordered guerrilla warfare. Chinese captured a garrison of 270 Japanese soldiers. International boycott of Japanese products has been suggested for France, Russia, Great Britain and Holland, which countries would form an alliance. The program was laid before the International Conference at Brussels three days ago.

At Paris today a 5-day period of government ended. Camille Chautemps has formed a new cabinet of 33 members of his party. Communists have 73 votes in the cabinet, but not enough to block the new Government.

Labor warfare in Vera Cruz Mexico, yesterday caused the death of 100 men, while 5000 soldiers were mobilized on the scene.

The Japanese government has announced it will continue to bomb the Hong-Kong-Canton railway in spite of British protests. Fighting continued north of Shanghai in deep snow and bitter cold.

THE NORTHWEST

U. S. Engineer Frank Banks, at the Grand Coulee project said yesterday the government may take over the construction project rather than leave the completion to the contractors.

The Astoria City Council announced yesterday it was redrafting its constitution to make slot machines amusement devices, using non-salable tokens.

An edict was issued early this week in Umatilla stating all pin ball machines must be removed by February 1.

Protests against increase in freight rates were voiced at a hearing yesterday in Portland by farm and lumber groups. Irving King, Washington State Grange Master, said if freight rates are not lowered, Washington farmers will ship produce down the Columbia River.

A landslide in northern California Monday night disrupted service of the Southern Pacific Railroad. Tracks were blocked at a point five miles north of Dunsmuir.

NEWS OF THE NATION

Three federal investigators began a hearing yesterday at Bozeman, Mont., over the recent airliner crash in that region.

Points in eastern Canada yesterday morning registered 48 degrees below zero. New York, Maine and Pennsylvania reported sub-zero weather. Temperatures were moderate in other parts of the country.

Eighteen U. S. Navy bombers (naval mass flight) took off at 9:36 a. m. yesterday for Pearl Harbor, Honolulu in a naval maneuver.

J. Edgar Hoover arrived today at St. Paul with Peter Anders, 30-year old logger of Tacoma, kidnapper of Charles Ross. He was captured at Santa Anita race track with one of the ransom bills. He is believed to have also killed the Mattson boy of Tacoma.

ON THE LABOR FRONT

Little headway is reported in the Portland strike of Multnomah Typographical Union. No early settlement is seen. Business is beginning to fall off, because lack of advertising is felt.

Two sawmills—Clark & Wilson Co. and B. F. Johnson—resumed work with 650 men, after a strike. Six Portland mills are now operating.

One hundred thousand gallons of unfinished sauerkraut may spoil in Astoria unless labor troubles are settled at the Old Faithful Sauer Kraut factory.

MARKETS

The price of butter was raised from one-half to one cent a pound by the Portland Produce Exchange yesterday.

The apple market was listed as follows: Supplies heavy, demand slow, market weak.

REAL ESTATE HAS NO VALUE BEYOND TITLE

Good title to real estate is the absolute and undoubted right to possess, use, enjoy and dispose of the land, the things contained therein, permanently attached thereto, the space above and certain interests in or attached to any or all of these.

It has come to our attention that many purchasers of abstracts erroneously believe that when the abstract office fills an order for an abstract, that the mere fact of furnishing same conclusively shows that there are no clouds upon or flaws in the chain of title. We wish to correct this erroneous impression. It is the part of the abstract office to do only those things that are certified to by it, and the abstract as it is finally built up and assembled shows the instruments which form the chain of title as they appear from the sources referred to in the certificate—be the title good or bad. Hence, the abstract, when procured should be submitted to an attorney for examination and for his opinion as to the character of title which opinion is now usually given, according to the more modern practice, in writing.

MINERALS FOR CATTLE DISCUSSED

Oregon City—Feeding about two per cent of steamed bone flour with grain concentrates has been found the best, most practical and least expensive method of supplying minerals to livestock, says J. J. Inskeep, county agent. Many good commercial feeds include needed minerals, he says, and directions for mixing feeds and minerals on the farm are obtainable from his office. He urges farmers to beware of products being offered at high prices and for which extravagant claims are being made. The only minerals recognized as of practical value for cattle here are calcium and phosphorus, which can be obtained at less than three cents a pound, he says.

SCIENCE SCHOOL LEADS IN COLLEGE TEACHING
