Arlington Harbor Proposal To Get Engineers' Study

Army engineers will study the advisability of providing a harbor for Arlington, Ore., 100 miles east of Bonneville.

The survey was requested by the Senate committee on commerce. Senator McNary of Oregon, author of the resolution, did not specify the depth desired. He said citizens of that area asked him to obtain congressional authority to dredge a channel to the Arlington port. The existing channel is on the opposite side of the river.

Commerce committee clerks said the engineer corps usually took three months to a year to report on such projects. McNary said there had been no estimate of the cost.
