Power Districts Referred to The Voters

Establishing of power districts is to be put before voters at the coming May primary election, according to announcements made this week. The much-publicized seven-county district and Marion and Linn counties will have their proposition on the ballot. Power districts for Multnomah, Lane, Wasco, and Hood River counties may also appear on the ballot, it was indicated.

The seven-county district, embracing parts of Clackamas, Washington, Columbia, Clatsop, Yamhill, Lincoln and Polk counties, has passed the preliminary stage, hearings having been held on it and reports filed by the state hydro-electric commission. In Linn and Marion counties where voters defeated power district proposals before, it appears certain that organization proposals will be submitted at the May primary, although some question exists about Marion county. The Clackamas county planning board, at its last meeting, adopted a special election for the proposed seven-county district.

Preliminary petitions, circulated in Wasco and Lane counties, were faulty in that signatures were obtained on the wrong number of sheets, but this is being corrected. Proposals to form power districts in these two counties cannot be prepared in time for the May primary, however, but may be ready for the voters by the fall election.

Hood River County, which also voted down the first power district proposal, may come to an election again, although sponsors there apparently hesitate to put it to a vote until some provision is made to issue utility rev-

enue bonds which are not permitted under the present people's utility district act.

Preliminary power district petitions are also being circulated in Multnomah County and in the Mount Hood Loop district, though neither proposal can be completed in time for the May election.

Signatures to initiative petitions seeking to amend the Oregon P. U. D. law to permit issuing utility revenue bonds to finance construction or purchase of existing privately owned electric utilities are being sought. This proposal may go before the voters at the general election in the fall, or an amendment could be sought at the next legislature, proponents point out. The present law provides only for the issuance of general obligation bonds which are a lien on all property within the power districts.

Fish Stations Suggested to Offset Dam

B. M. Brennan, Washington fisheries director, proposed Friday, according to a dispatch from Washington, D. C., that the federal government finance construction of a series of fish stations in Central Washington to offset possible damage to salmon runs by Grand Coulee dam.

"The dam will permanently isolate the spawning and rearing area of 1100 miles of stream in the upper Columbia river," Brennan wrote Fisheries Commissioner Frank T. Bell.

"It is only right that the government pay compensation for this confiscation of valuable prior rights to the river now held by the fish and therefore by the state through installation and operation of apparatus necessary to perpetuate the salmon runs."

Brennan said he believed the reclamation bureau would be willing to cooperate in such a plan and his statement was substantiated by Reclamation Commissioner John Page, who said his service "recognized a responsibility."

The Washington official suggested a salmon trap at Rock Island Dam, 14 miles below Wenatchee, where eggs would be taken, fertilized, and transported to a hatchery at the confluence of the Wenatchee and Icicle creek near Leavenworth, Wn.

The hatchery would supply fingerlings to rearing stations on Lake Osouyoose, the Methow River and the main Entiat River.

The height of Grand Coulee Dam, Brennan said, made fish ladders impracticable.

Donaugh Advocates Defenses

Oregon is the forgotten state in the national defense program and the time has come for the state to press its demand on Congress for adequate defense, according to U. S. District Attorney Carl C. Donaugh, president of the Columbia Defense League and now a candidate for the Democratic Senate nomination. Since the war, California has obtained \$330,000,000 and Washington \$135,000,000 in army and navy establishments, Oregon only \$2,867,000. The government is spending \$250,000,000 on its Columbia River dam projects and it is logical with the present upbuilding of the region that stronger defense for the notoriously undefended Columbia area should be immediately obtained, Donaugh continued. He advocates immediate increase of defense facilities at Fort Stevens and Tongue Point.
