Forming of Power District Postponed

In the passing of a rather lengthy resolution, the Hood River City Council Monday night set aside for the present the decision of joining or not joining with the rural communities in the formation of a public power district.

The resolution was introduced on the recommendation of a special committee composed of W. S. Finney, Scott Aitken and Harold Dexter, who have been investigating for the council the feasibility of such a move.

The resolution brought out that at the present time there was not enough definite information avail-

able for the council to make a decision.

Three members of the council, Harry DeWitt, Cyril Lindley and Albert Peters, were appointed as a special committee to work with the aforementioned committee for the submitting to the council at an early date such information as to guide that body in making their decisions.

J. D. Ross To Speak At The Dalles

The second appearance of Bonneville Administrator J. D. Ross in the Mid-Columbia will take place March 7, according to announcements made public yesterday.
