Household Hints

Feather pillows should be aired on a clear, windy day. The sun brings out the oil from the feathers. They may also be freshened and made sweet-smelling by placing talcum powder in them.

Decorative colored sugars may be made at home by blending a few drops of cake coloring into ordinary granulated sugar.

Keep a piece of dried orange peel in the tea canister and a pleasing flavor will result.

Much of the tartness of sour fruits will be taken away if a pinch of soda is added during the cooking process; also much less sugar will be required for sweetening.

Many Gather For Hood Snow Sports

Two hundred and fifty persons frolicked in the snow at the ski area on the north slope of Mt. Hood Sunday. The principal attraction was the Mid-Columbia Field Day, sponsored by the Hood River Ski Club. Weather conditions were good, some new snow falling in the morning, and the afternoon bringing clear skies. A total of 148 persons signed the register at Mt. Hood Tavern, many registered at Homestead Inn and me were on the area who did not sign the Forest Service's registry book.

The slalom race was won by Jack Baldwin in 26 seconds, the victor receiving a pair of ski spanners as his prize. Second place went to Howard Ericson and Walter Hill of White Salmon who made the race in 27 seconds. Finishing first among the ladies was Frances Moller, 40.2, followed by Etta Hill, 57, and Marcia McClain, 59.

The down hill race was won by Myron Weygant who won a pair of ski climbers and made the race in 1.28. Bob Moller, 1.56 and Chan Smith, 2.03 took second and third, respectively. First for the ladies was Margaret Arens, time 2.47, followed by Marcia McClain, 3.13, and Frances Moller, 3.27.

The baseball game on skis resulted in a 1-to-1 tie in a contest between adults and high school boys. A number of novelty features were included in the program. In one of these all skiers glided down hill at one time. In another race each skier picked up his hat on the down-hill route.

Exhibition jumps were made by Wes and Myron Weygant and Carl Moody, the leapers soaring through the air 100 feet. One of these was a double jump, the Weygant brothers taking off simultaneously.

Cars had to drive over only one mile of snow to reach the area and meals and shelter were provided both at the Mt. Hood Tavern and Homestead Inn.

The new ski area at Cooper Spur has gentle slopes and is designed for beginners, stated Steve Coleman, president of the Ski Club, who urges all who enjoy winter sports to take advantage of the grounds on the north slope.
