TVA Would Buy Private Companies

People in the Bonneville district were this week regarding with interest reports from the east that TVA was prospering. According to information received here the Authority has waved a well-filled purse at private power companies in southeastern power companies and told them to "come and get it" if they were willing to sell out on the basis of what President Roosevelt calls "prudent investment."

David E. Lillenthal, young director at odds with Chairman Arthur E. Morgan of the TVA, announced the proposed purchases and invited interested utility officials to meet him and Vice-Chairman Harcourt A. Morgan at a conference in Chattanooga, Tenn., on March 11.

He said the proposed purchases virtually would put private power enterprise out of business in northern Alabama, northeastern Mississippi and about all of Tennessee.

Improve Historic Road

In about 1866 a road was constructed for Hood River to old Fort Dalles. This week PWA workmen started improving a section of this road located just above the old east side grade. Work started last Tuesday to make this a 22-foot roadway.
