Indian Reservations

The five civilized tribes of Indians were established in Oklahoma long before the Civil war, states a writer in the Cleveland Plain Dealer. They were southern tribes, and were removed beyond the Mississippi to make room for settlers. The five were the Cherokees, Choctaws, Chickasaws, Creeks and Seminoles. These Indians took the southern side during the war. For that and other reasons they were deprived of some of the western part of their lands. On the ceded portions the government established Sacs, Foxes, Cheyennes and other plains Indians. Later other tribes were moved in. In the Indian Territory, the eastern half of the present state, there were in 1900 not only the five civilized nations, but also reservations for Modocs, Ottawas, Peorias, Quapaws, Senecas, Shawnees and Wyandottes. In Oklahoma Territory there were Kaw, Osage and Wichita reservations and one for Kiowas, Comanches and Apaches.

Indians' Names Serve as a Part of Their Record

Indian children have an infant name for identity, and an "earned" name, usually acquired in the teens, which is given for outstanding achievement or personal idiosyncrasy. A third name is usually given, called a "dream" name, when the recipient has dreamed of his guardian in the spirit world. The name by which he is best known, however, is the second or "earned" name.

An infant Indian name is not associated with any family, as we use a surname, but merely puts a temporary little tag on the child, according to a writer in the Washington Star. It is often rather amusing, such as the name "Two Ways," given an Indian toddler because he went first to the right, then to the left when learning to walk.

When in his teens an Indian boy may distinguish himself with the bow and arrow. Perhaps his aim is so fine that he may hit a mark expertly, even when aiming over his shoulder to the rear; in this case, he will surely be given the achievement name of "Aims Back." Every one will thus know of his cleverness.

Since the American Indians are forced to live in a modern world, full of white people, with names chosen in a different way from their own, many of them have prefixed American names to their own for convenience. So we find such names as Tom Day Rider, Charles Ironbreast, and Mike Little Dog among the Indians.

The Fasces on Our Coins

The fasces on our dimes are emblems common to works of art. The fasces were the rods made into a bundle to enclose a protruding ax and were borne by the ancient Roman victors to execute the judgment of the magistrate. Adolph Alexander Weinman, a native of Germany and a member of the United States commission of the fine arts, in 1916 designed our 10-cent pieces and the 50-cent coins.

Brazilian Venice

Pernambuco is called the Brazilian Venice because of its canals, deepened to obtain filler for lowlands. The city is the easternmost in South America and the white crested surf of the clear Atlantic never ceases beating upon its shores. In the old part of the city the streets are narrow and the houses tall, the idea being to obtain the maximum of shade.

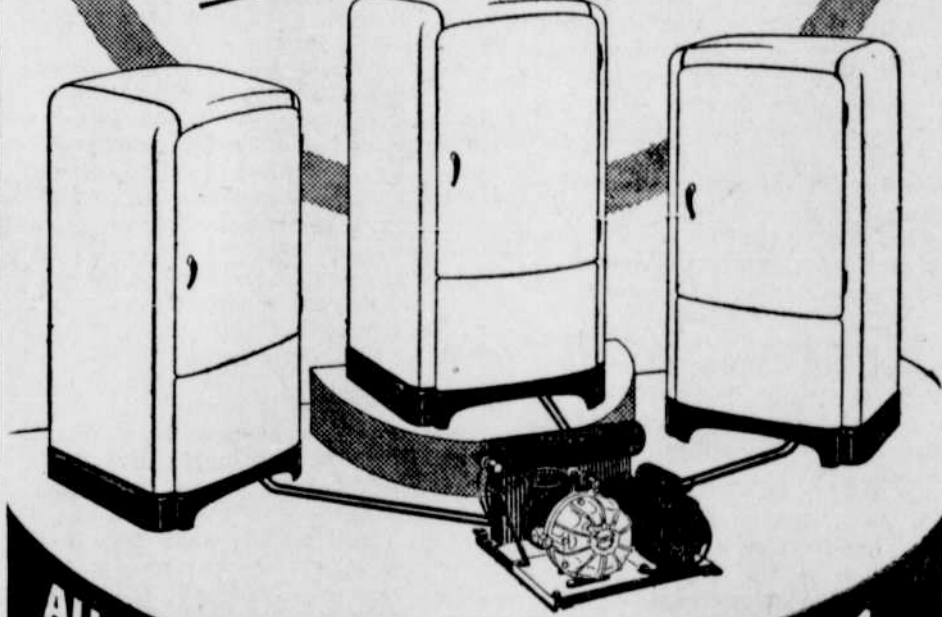
