Snow Flies; Spring Gets Set-Back

ROSS PLANS TEST TRANSMISSION LINE

SEATTLE—J. D. Ross, Bonneville power administrator, said here that a 20-mile test line to run from Bonneville dam will be constructed this summer to "prove out" experiments which will save as much as \$9000 per mile in construction of transmission lines.

Ross said electrical engineers have conducted test line experiments for years and will substitute direct for alternating current and will employ two wires instead of six. Inexpensive poles will be used, Ross said.

The test line will carry only direct current, Ross said, and will be transformed into alternating current at the receiving end. He said this will provide twice as much electric energy and transmit it twice the distance at the present cost.
