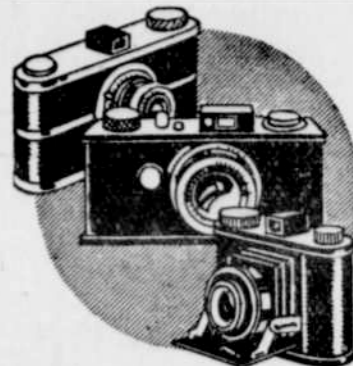
MORE MOTORISTS

Highway travel in Oregon jumped 17.5 per cent during January and February this year, according to Secretary of State Earl Snell. This increase in traffic makes the simultaneous drop of 35 per cent in highway deaths all the more remarkable, Snell declared.

In Ireland, pedestrians were held directly responsible for 47 of the na-

tion's 214 road fatalities last year. Drivers were held responsible for 88 fatalities, and bicyclists for 41.

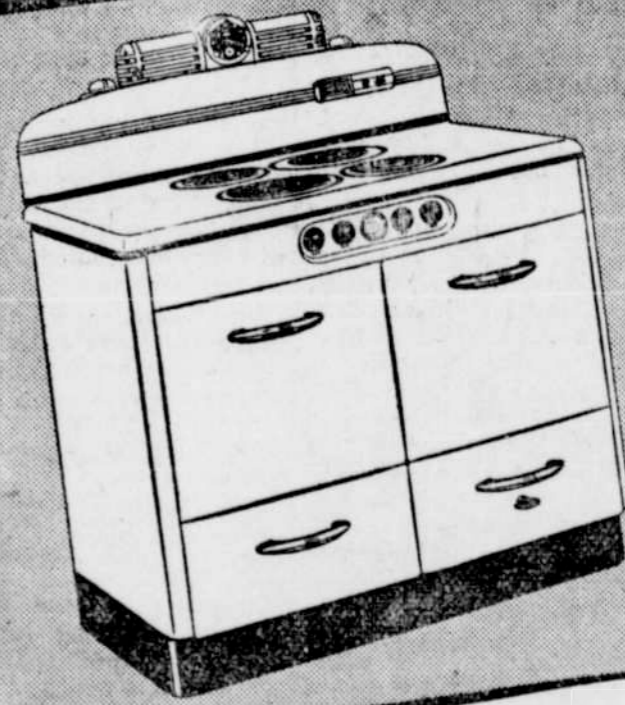
