Kindergarten Recital—

An annual event always anticipated by parents and friends of the children of Miss Veatch's kindergarten took place last night at Legion Hall.

In a room lined with flower covered trellises and filled to overflowing with the appreciative audience, the little tots displayed the talents which their devoted young teacher had helped each one develop during the past year.

Those who were present realized how difficult it is to decide upon the highlights as the calibre of the whole performance was so excellent. Any choice must be a purely personal one.

The program opened with a group of Rhythm Orchestra numbers by the children. The Cossack number was given a touch of color by a folk dance by four small boys in Russian tunics. A dance by Loralee Price as "Shirley Temple" and Jimmy Richards as "Charlie McCarthy" proved decidedly popular. The story of Hiawatha's childhood as recited by Jeanie Pattison and Katherine Sonnichsen, accompanied by a class chorus singing "Hiawatha's Lullaby" was another outstanding favorite. The "whistling" number by Gordon Loomis and Hubert Garabrant was of unusual merit. Hubert who has been listening from his window to the songs of the birds as they arrive, gave a truly remarkable original interpretation of their music.

River Sportsmen Take Cold Baths

Thrills, spills, and chills were the order of the day on Hood River's harbor Sunday, with the placid waters of Lake Bonneville dotted with small pleasure crafts and scores of bystanders viewing the manoeuvres from the shore.

The first spill took place when Charles Ferguson operating a hydroplane racing boat upset well away from shore and plunged together with his passenger, Robert Jacques, into the none-to-warm waters. The capsizing was due to metal rims on the bottom of the boat, which had not been secure, loosened when the boat made a sharp turn. The swimming boat-men were rescued by Cliff Anderson, while Joe Young and Ted Lester recovered the boat, towed it to shore and emptied it of its cargo of water.

A canoe, equipped as a sail boat, operated by White Salmon parties, capsized and the occupants were also rescued by Cliff Anderson in his speedboat.

A third spill took place when Joe Young, riding a surf board, took a plunge on a sharp turn, and found himself swimming in the chilling waters.

Pioneers of County Plan Annual Meeting
