

New 6-cent Stamp Is Announced

Issuance of a new six-cent air mail postage stamp in celebration of National Air Mail Week, May 15-21, was announced today by Postmaster General James A. Farley in advices received by Postmaster Mrs. Blanche North and Margaret Callendine at Cascade Locks.

The new air mail stamp will be placed on first-day sale May 14 at Dayton, Ohio and St. Petersburg, Florida, and on general sale throughout the country the following day or soon thereafter as distribution will permit, according to the advice. It was at Dayton, home of the famous Wright brothers that their first plane and subsequent improved models were manufactured, while St. Petersburg is notable in aviation as the scene of the first passenger flight.

Postmaster Farley also announced dates and places of first-day sale for the first four stamps of a new reg-

ular series. They are the one-cent George Washington issue, Washington, D. C., May 5; half-cent Benjamin Franklin, Philadelphia, May 19, and two-cent John Adams stamp, Washington, D. C., June 3.

In each instance the first-day sale will be limited to those post offices named, with general sales throughout the country the following day or as soon as possible to make distribution of the respective issue. Further details on the issues as to size, design, color, cover arrangements, etc., will be announced later.

New Deputy Issues

Warning to Dog Owners

Appointment of C. A. Swarts as a deputy officer in charge of enforcing dog regulations was announced by the County Court Friday. His duties have already begun and he has announced that all dogs in the county must be licensed or they will be disposed of. Licenses should be affixed to dog collars or harnesses, said Swarts.

The necessity of dog owners in the county keeping their canines tied or indoors at night has been brought out. Large dogs, particularly Collies, Shepherds, Airdales, and Police Dogs have been known to have molested livestock in the valley. Some sheep have been killed by roaming dogs. Keepers of livestock are licensed to kill all dogs found molesting stock.

BOATHOUSE MOVED

The boathouse recently constructed by Ted Lester and Joe Young, Yacht Club property proprietors, which has been moored near the mouth of Hood River at Morrison's landing, was moved Sunday to its permanent location along the mole, just north of the Union Pacific depot. A moorage will be built by the first of the month, according to Skipper Young.

Hood River Valley Observes Blossom Week

With radio announcements from KGW, KEX, KOIN, and the Richfield reporter last Friday and Saturday together with a story in the Oregonian and a picture in the Rotogravure section of the Journal of the valley in bloom, the Hood River Blossom route trip laid out and sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce got off to a good start last Sunday and will continue to have support for the next two Sundays.

The route was laid out and marked by the chamber with large red arrows on white cards showing the best blooms in the valley. Each Sunday they will be changed to move with the splendor of the blossoms.

For three weeks fruit trees will be blossoming. The region extending five miles south of Hood River, known as the lower valley, will see pear blossoms during the present week. During the following week pear orchards in the upper valley will be in bloom. Within two weeks fruit men predict the apple trees will be in full blossom in both the upper and lower valleys.

From nearly every point along the blossom route, both Mt. Hood and Mt. Adams can be seen in full view. Timbered ridges lining the valley have seen their foliage become greener with the leafing out of oaks and shrubbery.

Seek Broad Support for New Highway

The River and Highway development committee of the Hood River Chamber of Commerce this week set out on two projects both expected to benefit Hood River in the future.

The committee received the backing of the board in the first of its projects set up by Chairman Minor Cornman to the extent of financing the traveling expedition of two men to all cities and communities benefited by the Columbia River highway. The purpose is arousing interest in the early construction of a water-grade highway. A complete campaign has been mapped out and it is hoped by these efforts to bring before the state highway commission enough evidence to secure immediate action.

The other project is assembling data on the feasibility of diking in sections of the lowland directly north of Hood River for the purpose of dredging sand into the diked land to make available suitable factory sites for future development. A full report on this project will not be forthcoming for some time, as the committee is anxious to make an exhaustive study of the situation.
