HOW FAST SHOULD DRIVERS

PASS A "MEN WORKING" SIGN?

While there is no definite indicated speed listed in the motor vehicle law for this case, the motorist should regard a "men working" sign as an indication that he should prepare to stop in case the roadway is obstructed. Particularly on a curve, where vision is cut off, the motorist should proceed cautiously when he sees such a sign, as there may be one-way traffic ahead.

In proceeding past a group of workmen on the highway, one should not exceed a speed of 15 or 20 miles per hour, since the workmen are keeping their minds on their job rather than on the passing traffic, and are apt to step suddenly in front of a car without looking. Any greater speed may be interpreted as reckless driving, which includes driving "at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger or be likely to endanger and person or property."

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SKI JUMPER WILL HELP DEVELOP IDAHO PLAYGROUND

Appointed as a member of a newly created bureau specializing in travel to Sun Valley, Idaho, Darroch Crookes of Seattle, member of United States Olympic ski team in 1936, has joined the Union Pacific Railroad with headquarters at Portland. The appointment, effective this month, was announced today by A. S. Edmonds, assistant traffic manager.

Crookes, a former University of Washington skier, recently returned from Juneau, Alaska, where he made a ski survey for the United States government, the first definite move toward the development of winter sports facilities in Alaska.

"Crookes' duties as Sun Valley representative for the territory of Oregon and Washington will be to develop additional travel to Sun Valley, now bidding for national supremacy as a dude ranch and summer resort," Edmonds said.
