

CAMP FIRE PARK DEDICATED

Nearly 100 members of Camp Fire groups of the Hood River County gathered at the triangular plot at 12th and Oak Streets Saturday afternoon for dedicatory and shrub-planting ceremonies. Each girl brought a shrub to be used in forming a border to the plot and wild flowers which were planted along the stream that flows through it.

Mayor A. S. Kolstad, in presenting the plot to the Camp Fire girls for their use, expressed appreciation to Mrs. Walter Daggett, who fostered the idea of converting the plot into a Camp Fire site, to Lloyd Moss, of Odell, who donated large quantities of shrubs in addition to those brought by the girls; and to Walter Daggett for his work in constructing an out-of-door fireplace in the center of the grounds. Mrs. Decatur Baldwin, responded, speaking for the Camp Fire Board of Sponsors. She told of the Indian village in years gone by which was located at this site, and of the relics unearthed there a few years ago by representatives of the Smithsonian Institute. The spot has been named after two Hood River young people, who, in recent years met untimely accidental death, the triangular plot to be called Jane Wheeler Park, and the roadway which passes by making a diagonal route from Oak to State Streets has been named Victor Howell Road.

Rustic benches and park fittings are now being made by the Camp Cascade Locks C. C. C. group. The portion of the triangle nearest the highway is to be landscaped by the Garden Club, as is a similar spot just across the new roadway. The ground just east of the Camp Fire Girls' park, owned by Mrs. Stanley of Wasco will be built into a children's playground, according to present plans. Mayor Kolstad has contacted Mrs. Stanley, who has consented to having the plot built into a playground. The mayor expressed the hope that local civic groups will interest themselves in developing the playground.

Closing the ceremony, the Camp Defiance song, written by Miss Roberta Sinclair, and chosen at the last Council Fire, was sung by the Senior Camp Fire group, of which Mrs. E. O. Blanchard is guardian. This was followed by a Camp Fire song, by all the members, after which the new grounds were given a practical inauguration with a weiner roast.

ARMY AGAIN "FULL UP"

Major H. D. Bagnall, the Army Recruiting Officer, 323 Main Post Office Building, Portland, Oregon, announced today that since early in February, when recruiting was ordered suspended by the War Department because of the over-strength status of the Army, small special quotas for a limited number of recruits only have been placed on the Portland Recruiting District. The Major stated that these quotas have now been filled and that Army recruiting has reverted to a waiting list basis, with the exception that previous service men may be accepted who have been honorably discharged from the Army within the 90 days immediately preceding their making application for reenlistment. A few qualified bandmen may also be accepted for Coast Artillery and Infantry Bands in Hawaii and Panama.

Household Hints

For decorative touches on small daughter's dresses use linen handkerchiefs. These may be cut diagonally into collar and cuffs or the corners may be made into very attractive flaps for pockets. Since the handkerchiefs come in almost any color and have touches of lovely handwork, you will find that you not only save a great deal of time and trimmings but also have the prettiest of trimmings.

Equal quantities of mustard and grated horseradish when mixed make an excellent relish for cold meats.

One-fourth cup bread crumbs and 2 tablespoons of water added to each pound of meat when preparing hamburger steak makes a much lighter mixture.

When pillowcases begin to show wear, rip or draw the end seams, open the case. Then refold it, changing the creases from the sides to the center. Sew the end seam again and you will have a pillow case that will give you added wear. Embroidered pillow cases altered this way can be concealed under spreads.

Recipes . . .

Spice Cakes—

Stir up 1 egg with 1 cup sugar; add 1 teaspoon cinnamon and 1 teaspoon cloves. Then add 1 cup sour milk into which has been put 1 teaspoon soda; add ½ cup melted shortening. Stir in 2 cups of flour measured after sifting twice. Beat in all together. Add 1 cup of chopped raisins, ½ cup chopped walnuts, salt and flavoring. Bake in muffin tins in a moderate oven.

Portland School Will Stage Bonneville Pageant

"Bonneville, the Bountiful" is the title of a pageant being staged by the Joseph Lane School of Portland on May 13th. This is an evening, outdoor performance. Special illumination will add color and effectiveness to the portrayals given by hundreds of children.

Beginning with the Columbia cutting its course through the Cascade barrier the story runs rapidly, with ever growing appeal, through the coming of the Indians, the explorers, trappers and traders, missionaries and settlers, culminating in the building of the great Bonneville Dam.

SPEED GOVERNOR EXPLAINED

There has been a great deal of interest in the question of speed governors, and many persons have suggested that governors be placed on all automobiles or on automobiles of certain drivers as a means of preventing accidents.

The ordinary type of governor does not react to the speed of the automobile, but to the speed of the motor instead. Thus when the automobile is governed at 50 miles per hour in high gear, it will have a top speed of about 25 miles per hour in second gear and about 15 miles per hour in low gear. The governor itself is a small device through which the mixture of gasoline and air must pass before reaching the cylinders, and when this mixture reaches a certain velocity it partially closes a small valve, thus reducing the amount of gasoline which is being fed to the motor.

work the current was going through the dam leaving quiet water on the south side of Bradford, where as though arranged for the purpose, was a tiny cove above the dam.

Within a week, May 15th, 1937, to be exact, Mr. Nichols had erected an A-frame with skidway prepared to lift logs 35 feet out of the water and, of course, donkey and haulback. With .3 (three-tenths) mile haul down the island, two trucks working, the company was able to portage from 5 to 100 thousand feet of fir and pine in one working day. The company did its own towing to Bradford and hired the towing from there to market. During this time they employed two truck drivers, four men on loading and one on re-raffing.

Mr. Nichols' work previous to his present occupation sounds like the history of an amateur-nighter. He has been rancher, mechanic, garage owner, "cat-skinner," logger and shovel-runner. But in the back of his mind throughout the years has been the lure of water transportation.

Over ten years ago he broke into print, in the Four-L-Bulletin as part owner of the diesel tug, Star. Luke Nichols, so far as is known, is the first man to bring log rafts success-

use an average of more than 12,000 kilowatt-hours a year. In the Northwest we use only a fraction of that amount. Here is the chance for the kilowatt-year.

Kilowatt-Year Means More Power

Let us look at some of the Rural Electrification associations here in the Northwest. They build their own lines—pioneering in territory the private companies have not found profitable to enter. The associations buy their current wholesale and usually pay more than 1 cent a kilowatt-hour. That is equal to at least \$87.60 a kilowatt-year. At so high a wholesale rate, electricity cannot be distributed at a cost that will encourage farmers to use much more than a few lights and appliances. So the association buys only a small block of power—power which is used principally for lighting.

Now, we sell them the kilowatt-year. (And the cost will be only a fraction of the \$87.60 or more they now pay.) The association will try to have its members use that kilowatt of power every hour of the day. Milk refrigeration, brooders, grinders, winter lighting of hen-houses, electric incubators, soil heating for greenhouses, off peak heating; all of these can profitably be employed. It will be just as cheap for the association buying wholesale to use current all day long as to use it just a few hours at night. The extra cost of distribution will be small. The kilowatt-year—fully utilized can bring new security and satisfaction to rural life.
