Household Hints

Woolen garments will not shrink if a teaspoonful of glycerine is added to the warm water in which they are washed and rinsed. This also softens the water and helps to preserve the fluffiness of the wool.

To make your own carpet soap, stir an ounce of shredded soap into a pint of boiling water and add two table-spoonfuls of ammonia. Use with a soft scrubbing brush.

Unless bread boxes are aired regularly they become musty. A sunny spring day is a good time to wash the box and put it outside for a few hours to air.

Never remove the hulls before washing strawberries. Put the berries in a colander and rinse them under slow-running cold water. Then remove the hulls.

Egg stains on table linen should be soaked in cold water before being placed in the wash tub. The stain comes out quite easily if treated in this way. Hot water sets them and makes them doubly difficult to remove.
