Comment Made On Processing Of Phosphate

Residents of the Dam Area this week expressed interest in an editorial comment in the Oregon Journal regarding phosphate plants which would utilize Bonneville power. Following is the Journal's comment:

Studies of the nationally important phosphate beds of Idaho have been made by various public agencies, both federal and state, and research work has been intensified with the advent of Bonneville power.

More recently, engineers for Pacific Power & Light completed a detailed study of phosphates with particular reference to use of Bonneville power to produce tri-super-phosphate fertilizer of the TVA type. They came to this significant conclusion:

A 620-mile line of the Bolder-Los Angeles type, from Bonneville to Southeastern Idaho, would cost \$20,000,000. That speaks for itself. It would mean that it would cost \$41.25 a ton to stock-pile tri-super-phosphate in Idaho, but that Idaho ore could be shipped by rail and water and processed at Bonneville for \$34.17, from a 360,00-ton plant costing \$20,000,000. This is a \$7.08 a ton edge for the tidewater plant, and when shipping costs are added it grows to \$15 a ton, or \$5,500,000 a year on that volume.

It is obvious, from this, that if Bonneville power is used to process Idaho phosphates it will have to be at the dam. California, Oregon and Washington farmers would benefit materially from a tidewater plant, and Idaho farmers—pending develop-ment near the mines—would not suffer, because the finished product

could be returned to Idaho via water and rail and still cost less than if manufactured with Bonneville power in Idaho.

BUILD STONE WALL

Activity of stone masons has been evident just west of the Tooth Rock Tunnel. A rock wall railing is being constructed on the north side of the highway as a protection to motorists and sight-seers who stop at this point for a view of the dam.
