Engineers Back Up-River Development

Upriver improvement of the Columbia was this week given the approval of the Army Engineers, news from Washington, D. C., disclosed. The engineers recommended to Congress a long-term program for improvement of the Columbia and Snake rivers for the Bonneville dam's pool to Lewiston, Idaho, estimated to cost \$138,000,000 to complete.

Major-General Julian L. Schley, chief of engineers, proposed the program be used merely as a guide in providing for future navigation, irrigation and power improvements.

Big Generator at Dam

Put to Use Wednesday

Wednesday was a rather mentionable day in the history of the utilization of the Bonneville power, for on that day the huge generator unit Number 2 was switched to the local load around the reservation which has been handled by the station service unit. The station service unit has been closed down for minor repairs and adjustments. Unit Number 1 is undergoing slight repairs, changes and adjustments.

This is the first time the large units have been used for any commercial good.
