VACANCIES ARE ANNOUNCED BY THE U. S. MARINE CORPS

There are vacancies in the U. S. Marine Corps for immediate enlistment, according to an announcement received by Postmaster J. Dayton McLucas, Hood River, Ore., from Captain James B. Hardie, Officer in Charge of the Recruiting District of Portland.

Many desirable advantages are offered to a man while serving with the Marines, such as: free education, travel, and free medical attention.

Briefly, the requirements for acceptance are: Applicants must be U. S. Citizens between the ages of 18 and 25 years, of good habits and character. They must be between sixty four and seventy four inches in height and their weight must be in accordance with their height and age. Their ability to meet the remainder of the physical requirements is determined by actual examination by the medical officer.

BEAUTIFY HIGHWAYS

O. L. Crayton, Hood River Valley nurseryman, has a novel idea for beautifying the highways in this section, and at the same time, utilize the seedling cherry trees that sprout along the highways.

The seedling trees, which are the result of carelessly scattered seeds, have in the past proved themselves invulnerable to axes, and show a surprising amount of fortitude in growing in the most hostile place, particularly where they are not wanted. Instead of cutting down these saplings (which is usually a waste of time, since they grow right up again) Mr. Crayton suggests that blossoming Japanese cherry trees be grafted to them, and they be allowed to grow.

According to Mr. Crayton, the plan could be carried through with only slight expense, and the result would easily be worth it.
