But just as soon as summer approaches she knows her so-called day of rest, and often a big part of her Saturday in addition, is going to be spent in a red-hot kitchen cooking up a big dinner for a lot of people whose friendship always seems to take on a warmer glow as chicken dinner days draw on.

### NOTICE OF CHARTER AMENDMENT ELECTION

State of Oregon, County of Hood River, City of Cascade Locks—ss. Notice is hereby given that an election of the City of Cascade Locks, Hood River County, Oregon, will be held at the council room in the Fire Hall on 5th Street between the Columbia River Highway and Moody Avenue on the 6th day of July, 1938, between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 8 o'clock p. m. to submit to the legal voters of the city of Cascade Locks the question of enacting and adopting two charter amendments to the charter of the city of Cascade Locks, copies of which are attached hereto and incorporated, by reference herein.

The vote will be by separate ballots upon which shall be the words "Amendment to Charter—Yes" and "Amendment to Charter—No," and the voter shall place a cross (x) between the words "Amendment to Charter" and the word "Yes" or between the words "Amendment to Charter" and the word "No" which indicates his choice as to each.

The polls for the reception of the ballots cast for or against the measure will, on said day and date at the place aforesaid, be opened at the hour of 8 o'clock a. m. and remain open until the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of the same day when the same shall be closed.

### Electric Power System Amendment

Sec. 1. The City of Cascade Locks, through its Common Council, is authorized and empowered to own, acquire, construct, equip, operate and maintain, either within or without the statutory or corporate limits of said city, in whole or in part, a municipal electrical power system consisting of a supply line and distribution system, together with all appurtenances necessary, useful and convenient for the distribution of electric power and to acquire the necessary lands and rights of way therefore (hereinafter referred to as the "System"). For the purpose of providing funds for the aforesaid purpose, the Common Council of said city is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and sell bonds of said city in an amount not to exceed twelve thousand dollars, (\$12,000.00).

Sec. 2. Said bonds may be issued in one or more series, may bear such date or dates, may mature at such time or times, not exceeding thirty (30) years from their respective dates, may bear interest at such rate or rates, not exceeding 4% per annum, payable semi-annually, may be in such denomination or denominations, may be in such form, either coupon or registered, may carry such registration and conversion privileges, may be executed in such manner, may be payable in such medium of payment at such place or places, may be subject to such terms of redemption, with or without premium, and may be declared or become due after the maturity thereof, as may be provided by resolution or resolutions of the Common Council of said city. Said bonds shall be issued as general obligations and shall not be within any limitation of indebtedness fixed by the charter of said city, but shall be in addition thereto.

Sec. 3. Said bonds shall be payable as to both principal and interest primarily from and secured by a first lien on, and pledge of, the net revenues to be derived from the operation of the System (such net revenues being the gross revenues from said System after deduction only for the reasonable cost of operation and maintenance of said System) and if such net revenues are insufficient payable secondarily from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limit as to rate or amount upon all the taxable

property within the territorial limits of said city.

Sec. 4. The Common Council shall have the power and is hereby authorized to provide by ordinance or resolution for the enforcement of the collection of charges or rates which the said Common Council shall fix for the use of such System.

Sec. 5. The City of Cascade Locks shall pay monthly into a special fund or other such amount as the Common Council shall determine reasonable compensation for services and facilities afforded and benefits received by said City from said System for municipal uses and purposes.

### Warranty Refunding Amendment

Sec. 1. The City of Cascade Locks through its Common Council is authorized to refund any warrant indebtedness and to pay the same and also any warrant indebtedness it may have as of January 1, 1939. For the purpose of providing funds for the aforesaid purpose, the Common Council of said city is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and sell bonds of said city in an amount not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00).

Sec. 2. Said bonds may be issued in one or more series, may bear such date or dates, may mature at such time or times not exceeding twelve (12) years from their respective dates, may bear interest at such rate or rates, not exceeding 4 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, may be in such denomination or denominations, may be in such form, either coupon or registered, may carry such registration and conversion privileges, may be executed in such manner, may be payable in such medium or payment at such place or places, may be subject to such terms of redemption, with or without premium, and may be declared or become due after the maturity thereof, as may be provided by resolution or resolutions of the Common Council of said city. Said bonds shall be issued as general obligations and shall not be within any limitation of indebtedness fixed by the charter of said city, but shall be in addition thereto.
