LARGER SURFACE TO SERVE IN BONNEVILLE AREA

An inter-denominational "larger parish," first of its kind in Oregon, has been set up after more than three years of co-operation in the union church at Bonneville, denominational leaders having agreed thereto, and the project is being watched with great interest by churchmen, not only in this area, but elsewhere because of the unique features involved.

The "larger parish" will serve the Bonneville and Cascade Locks district under one minister which means that the churches at both places will definitely assume responsibility for the services of all the people living in those communities, according to a statement issued through the Oregon Council of Churches, which acted to bring about the organization.

A special committee was set up to supervise the work, consisting of Dr. F. E. Carlson, Congregational executive for Oregon; Dr. Perry C. Hopper, minister of the Westminster Presbyterian church of Portland and chairman of the committee on national missions of the Oregon synod, and Dr. Sydney Hall, superintendent of the Cascade district of the Oregon conference, Methodist Episcopal church. The Bonneville church will continue as a community project and the Cascade Locks church will operate under Methodist policy.
