

Umatilla Is Next Step in River Program

The Umatilla dam, for which the president has during the past week indicated he would allot both WPA and PWA funds, is part of an ultimate program to develop the Columbia and Snake rivers by a series of eight dams and locks to make them navigable to Lewiston, Idaho. Cost of this ultimate development has been estimated by United States army engineers in their report of June 30, 1937, at \$138,000,000 without power facilities. Fishways on these dams would cost \$10,000,000.

Is Another Bonneville

Umatilla dam, 292 miles from the mouth of the Columbia and some three miles above Umatilla, would be another Bonneville, on a smaller scale as it was projected by Colonel T. M. Robbins and C. I. Grimm, head engineer, in their preliminary report last year. It would have the same vertical lift spillway gates on the main dam, the same type power house and the same type fish ladders and elevators. Its barge locks would be 56 feet wide and 450 feet long and would accommodate vessels drawing 11½ feet of water.

The main dam would be about 100 feet long and 120 feet high from base to top and would extend across the Columbia in a north and south direction. The total lift of the single lift locks would be 52.5 feet as compared with 66 feet at Bonneville, and there would be two fish ladders instead of three and one fish elevator instead of two.

At \$49,470,000 Cost

Ultimate cost of the Umatilla Rapids project, including the power plant, would be approximately \$49,470,000, the power plant having a capacity ranging from 125,000 to 385,000 kilowatts. The fish ways would cost \$2,500,000, it is estimated.

Present plans call for construction of the main spillway dam, the locks and the fishways and the skeleton structure for the powerhouse. As indicated by President Roosevelt, WPA funds might be used to build roads and construction camps and do the small amount of clearance work involved, the PWA funds would be used for actual construction, just as in the case of Bonneville, probably \$5,000,000 being allocated to start the project.

Low Dams and Locks

The ultimate development of the Columbia and Snake rivers, to which the president referred in recent conversations with Senators McNary of Oregon, Pope of Idaho and Schwelbach of Washington, embraces low dams and locks at The Dalles, John Day, Arlington and Umatilla and four smaller dams and locks on the Snake river. The Columbia development, including power, would cost \$216,420,000 while the first cost of the four Snake river dams would be \$27,800,000, army engineers estimate.

The Snake and Columbia rivers will prove valuable in hauling raw materials such as phosphates, limestone, silica, clay and magnesite which manufacturing plants on the lower Columbia will process with Bonneville power. This traffic may reach 1,000,000 tons a year and save shippers approximately \$995,000 a year, the army engineers' report indicates.

Navigation to Grand Coulee would be facilitated as would also transportation of great quantities of lumber, grain and petroleum products moving in and out of the Inland Empire.

Interest and amortization charges on the \$23,700,000 Umatilla Rapids project would be approximately \$1,200,000 a year and maintenance \$195,000 annually. Irrigation benefits, savings on pumping equipment, have been figured at \$145,000 a year. No provision is made in present plans for lifting water out of Umatilla lake onto irrigable lands in that area.

NOTICE OF CHARTER AMENDMENT ELECTION

State of Oregon, County of Hood River, City of Cascade Locks—ss. Notice is hereby given that an election of the City of Cascade Locks, Hood River County, Oregon, will be held at the council room in the Fire Hall on 5th Street between the Columbia River Highway and Moody Avenue on the 6th day of July, 1935, between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 8 o'clock p. m. to submit to the legal voters of the city of Cascade Locks the question of enacting and adopting two charter amendments to the charter of the city of Cascade Locks, copies of which are attached hereto and incorporated, by reference herein.

The vote will be by separate ballots upon which shall be the words "Amendment to Charter—Yes" and "Amendment to Charter—No," and the voter shall place a cross (x) between the words "Amendment to Charter" and the word "Yes" or between the words "Amendment to Charter" and the word "No" which indicates his choice as to each.

The polls for the reception of the ballots cast for or against the

measure will, on said day and date at the place aforesaid, be opened at the hour of 8 o'clock a. m. and remain open until the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of the same day when the same shall be closed.

Electric Power System Amendment

Sec. 1. The City of Cascade Locks, through its Common Council, is authorized and empowered to own, acquire, construct, equip, operate and maintain, either within or without the statutory or corporate limits of said city, in whole or in part, a municipal electrical power system consisting of a supply line and distribution system, together with all appurtenances necessary, useful and convenient for the distribution of electric power and to acquire the necessary lands and rights of way therefore (hereinafter referred to as the "System"). For the purpose of providing funds for the aforesaid purpose, the Common Council of said city is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and sell bonds of said city in an amount not to exceed twelve thousand dollars, (\$12,000.00).

Sec. 2. Said bonds may be issued in one or more series, may bear such date or dates, may mature at such time or times, not exceeding thirty (30) years from their respective dates, may bear interest at such rate or rates, not exceeding 4% per annum, payable semi-annually, may be in such denomination or denominations, may be in such form, either coupon or registered, may carry such registration and conversion privileges, may be executed in such manner, may be payable in such medium of payment at such place or places, may be subject to such terms of redemption, with or without premium, and may be declared or become due after the maturity thereof, as may be provided by resolution or resolutions of the Common Council of said city. Said bonds shall be issued as general obligations and shall not be within any limitation of indebtedness fixed by the charter of said city, but shall be in addition thereto.

Sec. 3. Said bonds shall be

payable as to both principal and interest primarily from and secured by a first lien on, and pledge of, the net revenues to be derived from the operation of the System (such net revenues being the gross revenues from said System after deduction only for the reasonable cost of operation and maintenance of said System) and if such net revenues are insufficient payable secondarily from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limit as to rate or amount upon all the taxable property within the territorial limits of said city.

Sec. 4. The Common Council shall have the power and is hereby authorized to provide by ordinance or resolution for the enforcement of the collection of charges or rates which the said Common Council shall fix for the use of such System.

Sec. 5. The City of Cascade Locks shall pay monthly into a special fund or other such amount as the Common Council shall determine reasonable compensation for services and facilities afforded and benefits received by said City from said System for municipal uses and purposes.

Warrant Refunding Amendment

Sec. 1. The City of Cascade Locks through its Common Council is authorized to refund any warrant indebtedness and to pay the same and also any warrant indebtedness it may have as of January 1, 1939. For the purpose of providing funds for the afore-

said purpose, the Common Council of said city is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and sell bonds of said city in an amount not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00).

Sec. 2. Said bonds may be issued in one or more series, may bear such date or dates, may mature at such time or times not exceeding twelve (12) years from their respective dates, may bear interest at such rate or rates, not exceeding 4 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, may be in such denomination or denominations, may be in such form, either coupon or registered, may carry such registration and conversion privileges, may be executed in such manner, may be payable in such medium or payment at such place or places, may be subject to such terms of redemption, with or without premium, and may be declared or become due after the maturity thereof, as may be provided by resolution or resolutions of the Common Council of said city. Said bonds shall be issued as general obligations and shall not be within any limitation of indebtedness fixed by the charter of said city, but shall be in addition thereto.
