

CRITICIZES ROSS' TACTICS
 Criticism of J. D. Ross, Bonneville dam administrator, for discouraging instead of encouraging industry to take Bonneville energy, was made yesterday by Leslie M. Scott, president of the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

Taking issue with the dam administrator's view of the American economic system as expressed in a recent issue of the Public Utilities Fortnightly magazine, Scott charged that Ross' attitude "is that of discouraging the industrial use of power which would give these people employment at living wages."

Workers Absorbed, Claim
 Pointing out that "except for occasional panics" American business had been able to absorb all employables available Scott asked, "Why surrender the American economic system?"

"America could soon absorb idle workers who desired to earn if encouragement were given for the establishment of business which provides employment," said the chamber president.

"Our economic progress has been based upon the genius of our people introducing more and more of necessities and luxuries of life, bringing costs down to a lower and lower level, increasing consumption by the whole mass of people through lower costs."

Technological Studies Cited
 Recent technological studies were cited by Scott to show that the American worker is producing through the use of power the equivalent product of 50 workers using merely their hands, with no power or machinery.

To illustrate he drew a comparison between what an automobile

hub cap would sell for it produced by hand, more than \$4, as compared with the selling price of around 12 cents turned out by using machinery.

"This case illustrates fully the American economic system," he claimed. "By harnessing power and placing it at the command of workers, each individual has a productive capacity multiplied many fold, and while he receives the world's highest wages, the cost of his product is the lowest known in the world."

The Bonneville Administrator commented on the low construction costs now prevailing, and said it was an ideal time to develop the waterways

of the Columbia basin. "All of these projects add to the wealth of the Northwest. While they are humanitarian ventures in the sense that they will improve living conditions for our people, they are financially sound as well. Power pays its own way, and I can think of no better way to give productive employment to large numbers of persons than by developing our great hydroelectric resources."
