

## Camp Defiance Starts -- Open To All Girls

"Hi Sally!" "Yes, my bed roll's on the truck." "Oh, do let Anne ride with me." Such were the remarks heard Tuesday as Camp Fire Girls of Hood River County set out for Camp Defiance, the group's summer camp. Forty-two Camp Fire Girls headed for Camp Defiance and two jolly, carefree weeks of work and fun.

Some last minute changes in personnel placed Miss Evelyn Scott of Camp Namanu in charge as director, with five other Portland councilors to assist her in carrying out the Camp Fire program.

With Mrs. C. W. McCain, who directed swimming last year, serving as swimming councilor, that sport is bound to be a big feature of camp this year. A float with a lifebuoy for the advanced swimmers, and a crib for beginners insure safety. And the clean pure water of the lake will reassure many parents who have been worried about their children swimming in polluted water.

Mrs. Stanley A. Wells is in camp this year in charge of health and first aid, and Mrs. J. H. Kilbuck in charge of meal planning and preparation.

The second week session of camp will open next Tuesday, July 26th and registration is now open at the Chamber of Commerce. Girls who wish to register for the second week, should do so as soon as possible, so plans can be made for the full number. The full charge is \$5.00 per week for each girl, whether a Camp Fire Girl or not. Remember, this camp is open to all girls of the community from 8 years old through high school age. Each girl chooses the crafts and sports which she wishes to take, and the program is broad enough to cover the interests of every girl.

## 18th Annual Legion Climb Makes History

The largest crowd ever to assemble at Legion camp on the north slope of Mt. Hood congregated in the natural amphitheatre at Tilly Jane Camp Saturday evening to witness the lighting of three million candle power of magnesium flares and to take part in the broadcast of the program of the red network of the NBC.

Beside the waters of Tilly Jane Creek, with Mt. Hood peering through an opening in the forest to the west, 3000 persons crowded the newly-constructed benches of the amphitheatre located at an altitude of 6000 feet.

A campfire program was started at dusk, State Adjutant Carl Mosier of the American Legion introducing Mayor Joseph K. Carson, Jr., of Portland, as master of ceremonies. A welcome was extended the visitors by Harold Buck, commander of Hood River Legion post No. 22, and by Kent Shoemaker, chairman of the affair, a position he has filled for 18 years.

Greetings were also voiced by Alva Day, who has climbed the mountain every one of the 18 years that the supervised climb has been held. Short talks were made by Mrs. May Waters, department president of the Legion Auxiliary, by O. E. ("Mose") Palmateer, of Salem, state commander, Stanley Walters, Mt. Hood Forest Ranger, and Bill O'Rourke, commander of the Pendleton post, hosts to the 1938 American Legion state convention.

Musical numbers were offered by

the Singers Club, male chorus of Hood River, under the direction of Norman Canfield, by the Rose City American Legion post glee club, the Woolsey sisters of The Dalles, and by Ted Roy, famous tenor. Colored mountain scenes illustrated a lecture by Al Weisendanger, senior forest ranger of Eagle Creek.

Speaking of the work of the Hood River Legion in staging the climb and program, Palmateer declared this to be the finest example of community service carried on by any Legion post in the state.

The assembled crowd and the two male choruses furnished background for the radio continuity of the NBC program, the latter offering two special vocal selections. The microphone was shifted to the summit of the mountain, where a broadcast of impressions from the peak were voiced by Bob Tomlinson of the KGW staff, sent over short wave and rebroadcast by KGW. It was the first time in the history of radio broadcasting that a program originated at such a high altitude. Reports from listeners at receiving sets indicated that the broadcast, conducted with only temporary facilities, went over the air in grand style.

Tomlinson, sojourning on the mountain with temperatures ranging around 19 degrees, had been able to get very little rest since the Thursday evening before. The radio equipment, carried to the summit, was said to have weighed some 60 pounds.

At the conclusion of the broadcast, at 10 o'clock, magnesium flares were ignited by Hood River Crag Rats, stationed along the trails and ledges of the mountain. The flares were lit almost simultaneously and formed such tremendous candle power that the entire mountain was illuminated. Thirty-five Crag Rats were required to handle the fireworks. Had visibility been good away from the mountain, Legionnaires state that the display could have been seen for a distance of 100 miles. However, a pall of smoke from forest fires of the northwest made the mountain invisible for more than a 20-mile radius.

Parking space at the Tilly Jane camp was taxed to capacity, but lunch service, conducted by the Legion Auxiliary in its newly-constructed kitchen proved adequate.

## Recipes . . .

### Cottage Pudding (with chocolate sauce)—

Beat level tablespoon of butter with 4 level tablespoons of sugar. Add 1 egg, beat 5 minutes, add ¼ cup of milk, ¼ cup of flour, sift with one level tablespoon of baking powder. Bake in 5 custard cups, or in a pan. Serve with chocolate sauce as follows: Melt two squares of unsweetened chocolate in a bowl placed over boiling water. Cream together ¼ cup butter, 1 cup sugar. Stir the mixture thoroughly into the melted chocolate, add ½ cup of hot milk and stir until well dissolved and smooth, then add ½ teaspoon of vanilla.

### RECIPE

#### Braised Ribs Beef—

Roll tie or skewer 3 or 4 pounds of short ribs of beef, sprinkle with salt, pepper and dredge with flour. Sear all sides in melted suet or drippings, place in roasting pan or iron pot with tight cover, add 1 carrot, 1 onion, 1 small green pepper, 1 stalk celery cut up, 1 spring parsley and 3 cups boiling water. Cover tightly, let simmer 3 or 4 hours. Remove cover, place parboiled potatoes around meat; bake in oven

uncovered until potatoes are well browned. Remove meat; thicken liquor for gravy, place in deep dish with potatoes around it (of course untie meat.)

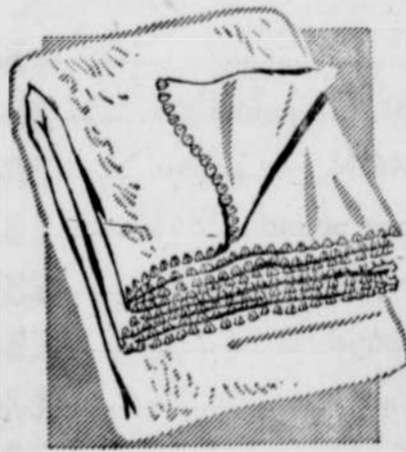
