Diesel Plants May Supply Wash. Power

Longview—A survey of existing power transmission lines in Cowlitz and adjacent southwest counties is now being conducted by the Bonneville engineering staff, J. D. Ross, Bonneville dam administrator, told the Southwest Washington Utility Commissioners' association at a closed meeting Wednesday night.

Ross said he was directing the survey with the assistance of Charles E. Carey, chief engineer at the dam. Several survey crews are covering the sector as preparations for construction of a network of power distributing lines go forward.

The public utility organizations represented at the meeting, from Cowlitz, Wahkiakum, Pacific and Lewis counties, expect eventually to receive power from the dam through the transmission system.

Diesel Plants Hinted

Ross also told the group that should private utility corporations refuse to sign contracts agreeable to the public commissions for service to REA lines now being completed in Cowlitz and Lewis counties it is probable temporary Diesel plants would be installed until power from Bonneville is available.

Plans call for a main transmission line through Cowlitz and Lewis counties, with branches to Raymond and Aberdeen. Some of the present lines, used by private utilities, may be utilized if favorable arrangements can be made, Ross said.

There is a possibility a line may be built through northwestern Cowlitz county into Pacific county as a shorter route to Willapa and Grays Harbor counties, it was said.
