

8 Cars of Brandy to Eastern Markets

Bad Check Passers on The Increase

Warnings were expressed yesterday for the benefit of Hood River business houses by Hood River County Sheriff John L. Sheldrake that forgery and obtaining money under false pretenses is on the increase locally.

During the last week there have been several cases, according to Sheriff Sheldrake, where bad checks have been passed. F. A. Thrasher was arrested Monday at Corvallis and brought to Hood River by the sheriff, to answer charges of obtaining money under false pretenses. He is alleged to have passed several worthless checks on Hood River merchants.

Thrasher served some years ago as manager of a Twentieth Century Grocery Store in Hood River.

Many offenders in recent years have served sentences for forgery and worthless check charges, it is pointed out, but in most cases, Sheldrake states, when they are apprehended the money is spent and the business man is the loser.

Accepting checks from individuals not definitely known to be responsible is a dangerous practise, local officers stated.

HOLMAN FLAYS INFLATION

Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, and candidate for United States Senator from Oregon on the Republican ticket, yesterday flayed money inflation, scored reciprocal trade agreements and gave his view on labor strife at a meeting of the Hood River County Pomona Grange at Parkdale.

Holman opened his address with a word about pioneers, telling how his family in the '50's came into Oregon on foot, and spoke of the trials of the pioneer peoples about which he had become familiar through his own experience.

He explained how the state had saved a million and a half dollars in interest through the plan now approved by law of borrowing from one fund to the other.

"Avoid it," he charged when he brought up the subject of money inflation. He mentioned Germany who tried it and got Hitler; Italy, who tried it and got Mussolini; the early Romans, who tried it, and suffered under the Caesars.

The state treasurer spoke of the current strife between CIO and A. F. of L. groups and told of one case where an operator lost over \$100,000 in his business when he tried to hire men from both groups.

He mentioned the livestock industry in his dissertation on reciprocal trade agreements. He disapproves the idea of restricting production, then buying imported products, as it is claimed the United States has done in recent years. The same situation applies to the lumber industry, Holman maintained.

J. J. Kubi, for many years speaker of the House of Representatives, and a prominent public figure in Oregon, also addressed the gathering at Parkdale, as did J. R. Forden, who spoke on the proposed power district in Hood River County.

Ray W. Gill, state Grange master, addressed the Grangers, during the general discussion.

Announcement was made of the coming Grange conference Monday, August 15, for Hood River County Grangers. At that time Parkdale, the host Grange will have charge of the fifth degree work, while the sixth degree will be conferred by state officers.

It was mentioned that the local conferences were being scheduled early, in order to have them completed before the National Grange convention which meets in Portland in November.

One hundred Grangers attended the dinner preceeding the meeting and many more were present to hear the speakers.

Hood's Eruption

Some local persons were heard to recently challenge the statement that Mt. Hood is an active volcano. Accounts of the eruption of 1859, taken from the Weekly Oregonian, are published in this issue on page 6, under the heading "Mt. Hood History."

Hood River

A new product of Hood River found its place in the markets of the East last week, when on Thursday, a shipment of eight carloads of apple brandy left town on its way to New York City.

The brandy was distilled by Hood River Distillers, Inc., at its plant in the eastern end of town, and was made from Hood River apples. The shipment contained 30,000 gallons and was loaded here on freight cars and hauled to Portland. There it was put on a boat, and went its way to New York by way of the Panama Canal.

It was the first major shipment of either wine or brandy from the Pacific Northwest to eastern markets.

Fifteen hundred tons of apples were required to make this amount of brandy.

Rock Begins to Fly On U. P. Project

Saturday saw the first actual work being done on the Union Pacific relocation project, for which the Morrison-Knudsen company of Boise, Idaho, were awarded a contract recently. Rock was moved from a pit at Viento to be used as rip-rap on a passing track nearby.

Recipes . . .

Peach Jelly

Pit and crush with peelings, 2½ pounds fully ripe peaches. Add 1 cup water, bring to boil and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Add a few crushed peach-pit meats to fruit during cooking. Place fruit in jelly bag and squeeze again. It there is a shortage of juice add water to pulp and squeeze again. Measure sugar

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and set aside. Measure juice into 3 or 4-quart saucepan and place over hot fire. Add powdered fruit pectin, mix well, stir until mixture comes to hard boil. Pour sugar in at once stirring constantly. Bring to full

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rolling boil and boil hard ½ minute. Remove from fire, skim, pour para-

ffin quickly on hot jelly. Recipe makes about 6 glasses.
