

Brothers Held For Theft of Club's Blankets

Three brothers, Leslie, Myron and Wesley Weygandt, held on charges of grand larceny, Monday waived examination and were bound over to the grand jury. They were accused of taking blankets, valued at \$60 from the cabin of the Snowshoe Club of Portland, near Cloud Cap Inn, on Mt. Hood. The alleged theft was said to have been committed about March 1 of this year.

Pleas of not guilty were entered by all three. Myron Weygandt was released on bond of \$500, while the other two brothers are being held in the city jail.

The grand jury is scheduled to convene in November, but reports indicated a possibility that the jurors will be called next month to consider the Weygandt case.

The blankets were said to have been discovered in the possession of the Weygandt boys during the Legion climb. At that time Leslie Weygandt, accused of the theft along with the two others, was out of the city. He came to Hood River from the state of Washington for questioning.

Iron Plant Now Considered on River

Another industry for the Mid-Columbia region last week with the announcement that creation of the Port of North Bonneville was definitely assured and that surveys were going forward to determine the location of a giant reduction plant for the manufacture of ferromanganese ores.

Leonard E. Kurtichanof was retained as port engineer. He is at present with the United States army engineers as chief electrical engineer on Bonneville Dam.

The port area will involve most of Skamania County. Quantities of Oregon ore will be used in the proposed plant, according to announcements. The nearest similar plant is in Ohio.

AWAIT POWER REPORT

No information was forthcoming this week as to when the report will be on hand from the state power commission relative to the proposed Hood River power district. A period of 120 days is allowed between the time of the hearing and the date when the report must be issued. That period will be up August 22, and local proponents of the power district are expecting the report to be available here next week.

Bass Plantings Requested for Local Sloughs

Efforts were being made this week by local sportsmen to prevail upon the State Game Commission to secure a quantity of bass minnows to stock the sloughs of the Columbia in this locality.

The region of Sauvies Island, below Portland, is now being seigned, and the bass removed from there. It is the hopes of the local men to secure some of these fish. The plan in stocking the sloughs here is not only to provide game fish, but to rid these pools of mosquito larvae.

Interested parties, including members of the Hood River County Game Protective association have contacted the State Commission in an effort to get the minnows planted here.

It is said that this last year that seigning operations will be carried on at Sauvies Island, as it is the plan to permanently drain the pools there.

Bass would find the sloughs a natural habitat, it is claimed. They thrive in water that is warm in summer, and the sloughs have enough of an intake that the water in them is not stagnant. It is also pointed out that bass eat young carp, and would rid the pools of these undesirable fish. Sportsmen also claim that there is no danger of the bass consuming the trout supply of this region, as the trout shun the warm and semi-stagnant pools.
