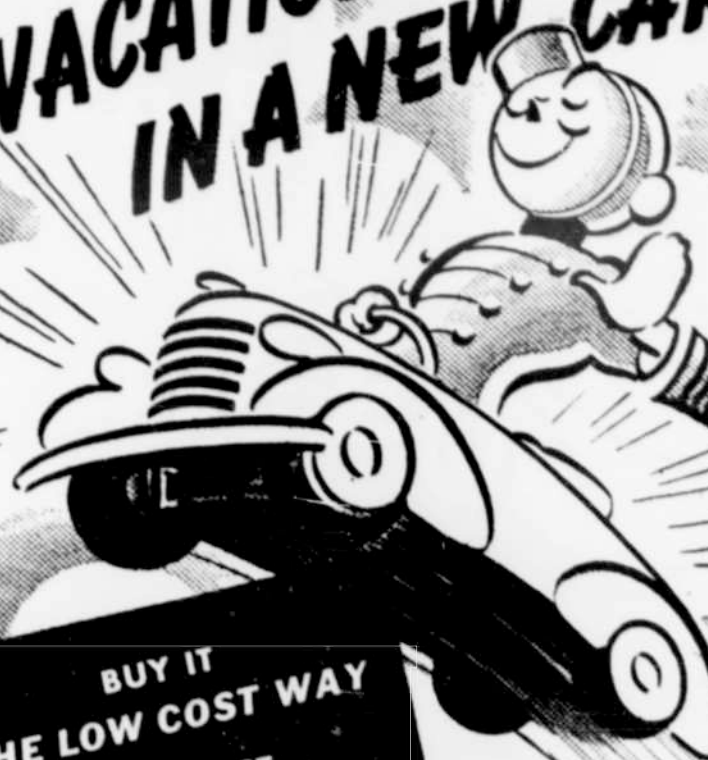

Ski Grounds Much Improved By CCC Boys

Steve Coleman, president of the Hood River Ski Club made a trip to the ski area near the Cooper Spur junction Sunday and returned enthusiastic over the improvements being made there this summer by a CCC contingent.

In charge of Herb Fifer, 35 men have been working on the area since June 1, with the exception of a few days when they were called away on forest fire-fighting duties.

Improvements include clearing the land and cutting off all stumps even with the ground. A shelter for skiers is being built, equipped with a fireplace, and facilities are being installed for tables, lunches, and various conveniences.

Preparations have been made toward a ski jump, actual construction of which must be carried out by the Ski Club. A large fill has to be made in Tilly Jane canyon for the ski jump. The slope of the canyon will be used as a run-way for the jump. Those who have seen the proposed ski jump grounds have declared that here will be one of the best ski jumps in the state.

A four-mile ski trail is also being constructed, starting at Tilly Jane Forest Camp and reaching the junction.

tion. It will be possible upon the completion of this trail for skiers to start on Cooper Spur and ski without stopping to the junction, a distance of some eight miles. The trail was blazed last June, marked with tall stakes painted red by Harold Wells, Blanchard Baldwin, John Arens, Percy Bucklin and Mace Baldwin.

Narrow Escape From Drowning At Lost Lake

Mrs. Rex Tobie and Miss Jeanette Adamson, both of The Dalles, narrowly escaped drowning at Lost Lake Sunday, when their rowboat capsized. Also a passenger in the boat was Rex Tobie, and he and Mrs. Tobie had attempted to change places in the small boat when it upset and threw them in the water. With the aid of a motorboat, Tobie was able to rescue his wife and Miss Adamson, though Mrs. Tobie suffered considerably from shock and immersion. Artificial respiration and restoratives were employed by Ted Lushman of the Portland Fire Department, who was on vacation and camping at the lake, and by Miss Mary Van Vactor, county nurse of Wasco County, who was there with the Homemakers.

The accident occurred on the west side of the lake, not far from the shoreline.

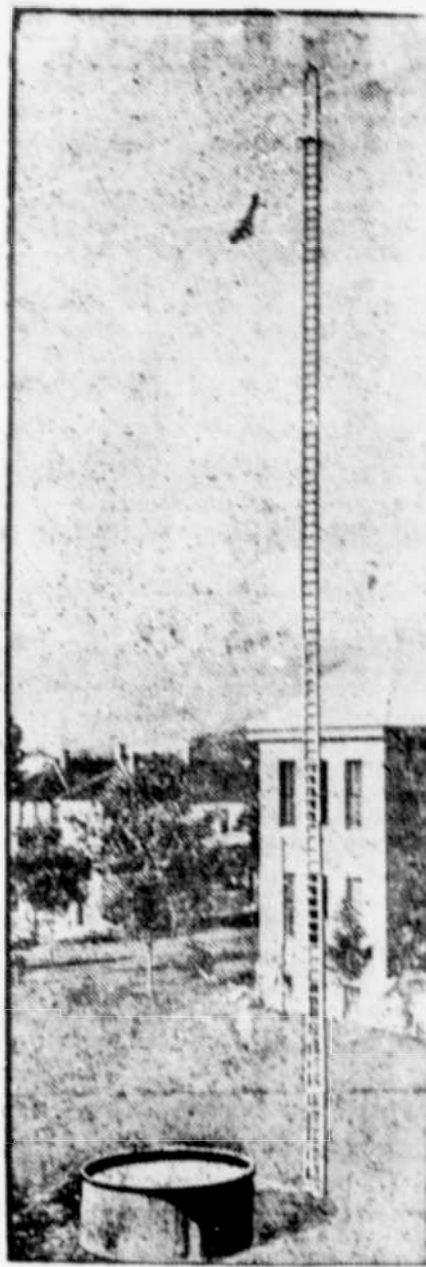

New Wine Ruling Effective Here

No fortified wine will be sold in pints in Oregon after September 1, the state liquor commission has ruled, Bill Carey, Hood River wine store proprietor announced this week. The state commission has made a ruling known as Regulation 19, which prohibits the sale of wine in pint flasks and sets 49 cents as the minimum price for bottles of wine of any size. Wholesale merchandising of the pint flasks was stopped July 1, and the regulation applies to retail stores beginning September 1.
