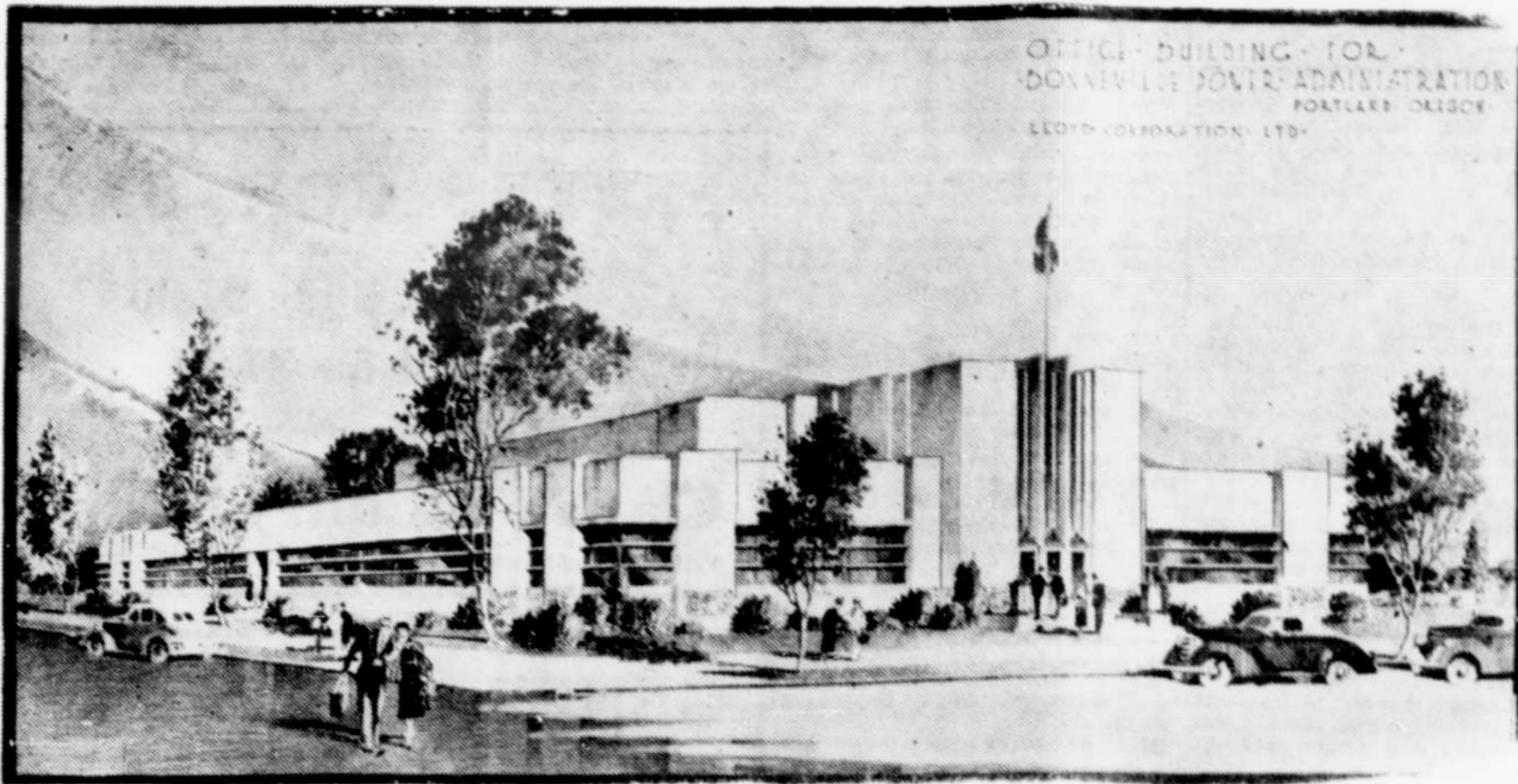


**New Building Planned for Housing Bonneville Administration**

eighty-five allotments, totaling \$9,823,625, for Washington; thirty-five allotments, totaling \$1,626,942, for Oregon; thirty-four allotments, totaling \$1,736,932 for Idaho, and eleven allotments, amounting to \$373,021, for Alaska.

These 165 projects will call for expenditures of approximately \$29,160,000 for construction, creating a payroll of nearly \$9,725,000 on the project site, and indirectly stimulating employment in almost every type of business and industry by creating a demand for all the varied kinds of materials required for the construction of these projects.

**ARMY POSTS OPEN**

Major H. D. Bagnall, the Army Recruiting Officer, 323 Main Post Office Building, Portland, Oregon, announced today that recent War Department regulations provide for the examination of applicants for commission in the Medical Administrative Corps, Regular Army, from November 14th to November 18th, 1938, inclusive.

Major Bagnall stated that to be eligible to take the examination for appointment, the applicant must be a male citizen of the United States, a graduate of a 4-year course of instruction at an acceptable school or college of pharmacy, legally authorized to confer a baccalaureate degree in pharmacy, and of such age as would permit appointment to be made between the ages of 21 and 32 years.

**September 30 Deadline for PWA Requests**

Communities in the Northwest were warned today by C. C. Hockley, regional director for the Public Works Administration, that they may lose out in participation in the new Public Works program because of their own inertia.

With September 30 set as the deadline for filing applications for PWA grants and loans, it is imperative for communities to act promptly in presenting their construction needs to the Public Works Administration, Director Hockley stated.

The PWA regional office already has received more than 250 applications for construction projects in this region, which includes Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Alaska, but is awaiting work from approximately 750 applications forms sent to public bodies in the various localities, the regional director said.

Delay in filing applications may bring disappointment to many communities wishing to share in the benefits of the PWA program, Director Hockley said. He quoted Administrator Harold L. Ickes as saying that the response from coast to coast by the various communities has been so great that many worthy and eligible projects submitted for consideration may not obtain allotments because they were too late, after funds were exhausted.

"With more projects being sought by the country as a whole than it seems likely can receive allotments, and a specific mandate from Congress that no applications can be received after September 30, it is obvious that communities in the Northwest which are slow to act may lose out," Director Hockley added. "If inert communities in this region wish to participate in the PWA construction program, they must act now."

Applications for grants and loans are being authorized by the Public Works Administration on a basis of "first come, first served." Communities that wait until the last minute to make known their needs may find that more alert communities have got ahead of them, the regional director pointed out.

The Public Works Administration, through August 13, had allotted \$13,560,520 in loans and grants for construction projects in the Northwest and Alaska. These included
