

County Retains Cellar Position

Registering tremendous decreases in traffic accidents and injuries throughout the state, plus a sizeable drop in fatalities, Oregon counties continued to improve their records during July and brought about stiffer competition for leading roles in the war against accidents. Secretary of State Earl Snell announced this week.

The decrease in accidents amounted to 24 per cent, the drop in injuries to 20 per cent, and in fatalities, 12 per cent, Snell said.

Hood River county took seventh place among the state's seven Group II counties on the basis of improvement over the first seven months of 1937 in traffic accidents, injuries and fatalities. Last month this county ranked sixth in this group.

Secretary Snell has divided the state's 36 counties into four groups on the basis of population density in order to make accurate comparison of accident experience. Counties in this group are Coos, Tillamook, Jackson, Lincoln, Lane, Linn, and Hood River, in the order of their ranking.

Placing first in Group II for the seventh consecutive month, Deschutes county strengthened its claim as the holder of the state's outstanding traffic record for the year to date. Clackamas county in Group I and Coos county in Group II, the other leaders, also registered gains during the past month.

Four counties—Clackamas, Multnomah (outside Portland), Marion, and Deschutes—noted a saving of six or more lives in traffic accidents during the first seven months of 1938, compared with last year.

RAILROAD RELOCATION

Construction of the Bonneville Project made necessary the raising and relocation of both the Union Pacific tracks and the Spokane, Portland and Seattle Railway tracks. The maximum increase in elevation of tracks is 35 feet. The new line of the Union Pacific is carried over Tanner Creek and the State Fish Hatchery grounds on a 900-foot double track concrete bridge on earth filled spandrel arch type, which also serves as a grade separation for the entrance road to Bonneville. Just above Bonneville a 620-foot concrete-lined double track tunnel was constructed through Tooth Rock, and a single track bridge having two 168-foot Pratt trusses was built over Eagle Creek. About five miles of new grade were constructed for the Spokane, Portland and Seattle Railroad which required a maximum rise in elevation of 7.5 feet. Minor changes were required in the railroads above Cascade Locks.

LANDS AND FLOWAGE

The land required for the location of the permanent structures amounts to about 800 acres and the area in the pool over which perpetual flowage easements have been secured amounts to about 5,200 acres. The lands lie in two counties in Washington and three in Oregon, and title held by approximately 425 owners is involved. Rights-of-way and title for Government was secured by purchase or by condemnation.

The original Government surveys in this vicinity were executed about 75 years ago. To determine accurately the present ownership and boundaries it was necessary to retrace about 700 miles of section, township and range lines, and to survey pool lines and flowage area lines on the fifty-mile stretch of the river affected.

G. Munro, Oregon director of the National Youth Administration, in which he stated that funds available for Student Aid projects in Oregon colleges have been increased \$19,000 this year for a total of \$134,000. In Oregon there are 23 schools in this group which will receive proportional allotments based on their past enrollment.

These student aid funds are available for needy college and graduate students in regular attendance in institutions of collegiate and university standing for part-time work during the academic year. Individual earnings are limited to an average of \$15.00 per month for students of collegiate standing and \$30.00 for graduates. Rates of pay at the individual institutions are determined by the college or university authorities. No provisions are made for direct loans or scholarships.

NEED ENTRIES FOR EGG SHOW

So that the state's important egg producing industry will be adequately represented at the Oregon state fair, September 5 to 11, at Salem, Bryant Williams, superintendent of dairy and poultry products, this week urged all poultrymen to submit entries in the egg show.

Fifty-five dollars is offered in premiums, and one dozen eggs will constitute an entry. Entries will be closed at 6 p. m., September 4.

Household Hints

Ayrshire Cow With 52-ton Milk Record at State Fair



After having made over 52 tons of milk during her life, Oregon Rena Douglass LL, a registered Ayrshire cow, will leave her home on the campus of the Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, to become the feature attraction of the dairy cattle show of the Oregon State Fair, September 5 to 11, at Salem.

This remarkable animal, according to Professor I. R. Jones, head of the Dairy Husbandry Department, is twelve years old, and has made 105,717 pounds of milk, 4099 pounds of

butterfat. Two of her full sisters, as well as her mother, have each made over 100,000 pounds of milk, which gives the state college group a world's record title for high production of a mother and three-daughter group.

Arrangements have been made to display "Rena Douglas LL" before a special scenic background. This exhibit, which is being sponsored by the Ayrshire breeders of the Pacific Northwest, will be under the direction of E. W. Van Sasell, well known breeder of Wenatchee, Wash.
