233 Workers Placed During August

A ten per cent gain in job placements in private industry was noted by the Oregon employment service for August, 3269 of the 5667 regaining a place in the industrial pattern of the state.

Figures compiled by the statistical department of the unemployment compensation commission, based on data from the 22 employment office centers in the state, showed Hood River, covering Hood River county, accounted for 233, or 4 per cent, of the state total.

The Portland metropolitan area again led the list, with 23.1 per cent. Other offices to show substantial gains were Astoria, Klamath Falls and McMinnville, while the biggest drop was recorded for Marshfield, 12 per cent.

The August total was slightly less than 1 per cent less than total job placements in July, but commission officials considered the gain in private industry placements overshadowed this.

Thirteen per cent of all placements were women, a gain of four per cent over July, and 403 of the 4948 males placed were veterans.

Job applicants 20 years old and those 24 got the most jobs, 140 for each age group. It was the fourth straight month youths of 20 led the field for getting back into private industry.

Industrially, public construction absorbed the greatest number from the Oregon active file, 1852, or 33 per cent of the total. Agriculture accounted for 971, or 17 per cent, and lumber manufacturing, 5593, or 11 per cent.

Budget Committee Personnel Named

Members of the County Budget Committee, recently named by the Hood River County Court, include George P. Coe, L. M. Baldwin and R. S. Hazelton. G. E. Manchester of Cascade Locks, who was also named on the committee, will not be able to serve, since he is a municipal officer and state law forbids such officials from serving on budget committees. Manchester is mayor of Cascade Locks. A member to replace Manchester has not as yet been named by the Court.

MANY HUCKLEBERRIES

The huckleberry season in the Twin Buttes area in Klickitat county, Washington, officially closed Sunday, September 11. The number of berry pickers and forest visitors was the largest this season of any year since 1931. From the period July 1 to September 11, 9901 white people and 1195 Indians were issued Camp Fire permits and registered at the Peterson register station. This is a total of 11,096 people.

The berry crop was above average and a total of 46,467 gallons were checked out at the Peterson station. The most berries taken out any one day were 3221 gallons on Sunday, August 7. The heaviest registration for one day was 780 white people and 44 Indians on Sunday, August 14. 2480 gallons of berries were taken out on the same date.—White Salmon Enterprise.
