They have cooperated to make business dealings more pleasant, and the new Retail Credit Association is one of Cascade Locks' forward steps.

PREVENTING THE MENACE OF THE FLAMES

Most of the educational matter published in newspapers in recent years on the subject of fire prevention has pertained to the national forests. This week is Fire Prevention Week and with the hazardous season for fires in the forests taken care of by rains, attention is particularly drawn to fires in and around the home.

As a cooperative measure during National Fire Prevention Week, October 9-15, R. E. Scott, proprietor of a Hood River fire insurance office, urges every man, woman and young person to familiarize himself with the exact procedure to be followed in case it becomes necessary to report a fire. Given below are some of the rules suggested by him:

1. Plan what you intend to do if a fire comes, then do it calmly and sensibly.
2. Make up your mind beforehand that you are not going to become excited.
3. Learn the location of your nearest fire alarm box. Make sure that you know how to operate it.
4. Write the telephone number of your fire department where it can be found quickly by any member of the family.
5. Use the most convenient of these methods to call the fire department.
6. Learn the correct operation of hand fire ex-

7. When using a hand extinguisher the fire should be attacked at its base.
8. If the clothing catches fire, tear off burning portions if possible. Attempt to smother the flames by wrapping victim in a woolen cloth. Do not allow the victim to run or move about.
9. When sleeping in a strange building, learn the location of the nearest exit before retiring.
10. If caught in a burning building, remember that smoke is thinnest near the floor. Make your way to safety by crawling or crouching.
11. When inside a burning building, close as many doors as possible in order to keep the fire from spreading.
12. If it is necessary to jump from a window, first throw out mattresses or bedding to break your fall.
13. If fire breaks out while you are in a crowded room, give the alarm quietly and unobtrusively so as not to create a panic. It is unwise to shout "Fire!"
14. When reporting by means of an alarm box, remain near the box until the firemen arrive so as to direct them to the fire with the least possible delay.
15. When the firemen arrive, remember to stay out of the way. Give them the best possible chance to work.
16. Remember that life always comes before property.
17. Remember that death rides with the fireman in his race to reach a fire. Don't handicap him by thoughtless acts.
18. When you hear the siren or gong, stay safely on the sidewalk.
19. If driving a car, do not race after fire apparatus or park in the vicinity of a fire.
20. Never, under any circumstances, park your car in front of a fire hydrant.

Said lands are situated in Hood River County, Oregon, and are particularly described as follows, to-wit:

ORDINANCE NO. 37

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT BY THE MAYOR OF A COMMITTEE TO BE KNOWN AS THE CITY LIGHT COMMITTEE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CASCADE LOCKS:

Section 1. That the Mayor do appoint a regular committee of three members of the council to be known as the City Light Committee.

Section 2. That because the negotiations and arrangements for the purchase of a city light plant and system are now in progress and a committee to handle the said negotiations and arrangements is an immediate necessity, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall take immediate effect upon adoption by the Common Council and approval by the Mayor.

ORDINANCE NO. 36

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR TIME AND MANNER OF HOLDING A GENERAL ELECTION IN THE CITY OF CASCADE LOCKS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CASCADE LOCKS:

Section 1. That a general election shall be held in the City of Cascade Locks on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1938, and biennially thereafter at which time there will be chosen such officers of said city as are by law to be elected in such year and such officers as may hereafter be provided for by law.

Section 2. That the City recorder is hereby authorized to procure and provide any and all ballots, ballot boxes, tally-sheets and such other supplies for each ward, precinct as are necessary to the proper holding and conducting of said election, and to deliver same to the respective election board or boards.

Section 3. The city recorder shall give notice of said election by posting notices thereof for a period of ten days in three public and conspicuous places within said city, which said notices shall be posted not more than fifteen days prior to said election nor less than eleven days prior thereto. Said notice shall be captioned "NOTICE OF GENERAL CITY ELECTION FOR CASCADE LOCKS" and shall state therein the date, place and hours between which said election will be held, together with any other matter deemed relevant thereto, and shall be signed by the city recorder and the date of posting entered thereon. Said city recorder shall make affidavit of such notice and the posting thereof and file the same in his office.

Section 4. The Common Council shall constitute the canvassing board and on the first Monday following said election or at such other time as the Council may designate shall meet at the Council Chambers at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. and proceed to canvass the votes cast at and returns made by the judges and clerks of said election, and shall

make and file in the office of said recorder a statement showing the total number of votes cast, the number received by the different persons voted for to fill any office and the persons who are elected to office shall be the persons receiving the greatest number of votes for their respective offices.

Section 5. Nominations for said election for any office to be filled thereat shall be made by filing in the office of the City Recorder a petition directed to the said recorder and requesting that the name of the person named therein, having the qualifications of an elector of said city, stating his place of residence, be entered upon the official ballot of said election for the office for which he is a candidate. And the said nominating petition shall be signed by not less than fifteen (15) qualified electors to nominate a candidate for an office to be filled by the officers of the city. When nominations are made in such manner said petitions shall be filed with the city recorder not less than twenty days prior to said general election date. Said nominating petition shall be in substantially the following form:

We, the undersigned, duly qualified legal electors and residents of the city of Cascade Locks, and the County of Hood River, Oregon, do hereby nominate

We respectfully request that the name of said be printed on the official ballots to be furnished for the said general election in the manner provided by law, to be voted for as a candidate and as our choice for said office. We respectfully represent that we are qualified electors of the City of Cascade Locks and of the County of Hood River, Oregon, and that our respective places of residence, with the street and number thereof, if any, are truly set forth opposite our names. is hereby nominated by individual electors and pursuant to Ordinance No. 36 of said city, as adopted on October 10, 1938.

And said petition shall contain an affidavit to be executed by one of the signers thereof to the effect that all of the signers are qualified electors of said city and that their residences and street numbers if any are clearly stated on said petition.

Said affidavit shall be in substantially the following form:

Section 6. Whereas no methods of election procedure have been provided for the nomination of officers or the orderly conduct of elections within the city of Cascade Locks, and said city has a population of less than 2000 inhabitants, and it is necessary for the peace and general welfare of said city that such provisions be made immediately to enable said city to hold its general election at the time of the general election of November 8, 1938, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage by the council and approval by the mayor.
