the tax problem, and into which J. D. Ross, Bonneville Administrator, has been drawn.

Ross recently rapped what he termed misleading statements regarding Washington public utility districts and later gave unqualified approval of the Washington PUD law. In several instances he has acted as appraiser of privately owned properties, urging the districts to pay a fair price as a matter of good business. Ross explains his interest in and support of public utility district programs by pointing

out that the federal Bonneville act directs him to give preference to public power agencies, reserving at least 50 per cent of Bonneville's power for them. He has promised to have lines built into Washington and Oregon within the next 18 months.

Guy Myers Fiscal Agent

Actual negotiations between public utility districts of Washington and the private companies are being carried on by Guy C. Myers of New York, fiscal agent for most of the organized districts on a 2½ per cent basis. Jack Cluck of Seattle and Herman Lafky of Salem represent a number of the districts as counsel and R. E. Towne of Tacoma is their engineer.

PUD elections will occur this fall in Clallam, Grays Harbor, Kitsap, King, Pierce, Thurston, Yakima, Clark, San Juan Island, Skamania,

Klickitat, Grant, Adams, Walla Walla and Columbia counties.

Power districts are already organized in Pen d'Oreille, Stevens, Lincoln, Ferry, Franklin, Benton, Okanogan, Douglas, Kittitas, Chelan, Whatcom, Skagit, Snohomish, Mason, Lewis, Pacific, Wahkiakum and Cowlitz counties.

This will leave only Jefferson, Spokane, Whitman, Garfield and Asotin counties without fall power elections.—Oregon Journal.
