CHUMS SCALE LADDERS

Bonneville fish ladders, which surprised the ichthyological critics when it was proved that salmon could get past the big dam with apparent ease and with no handicap to the migration, this week showed that fish could now ascend beyond the dam which previously had been halted by the Cascade rapids.

Several chum salmon, the run which is just getting under way in the lower river, have been passing up the ladders. Fred Morton of the fishways personnel reported. These are the weakest breed of salmon, and heretofore have spawned only in the tributaries of the lower river. The chum salmon, it is stated, does not necessarily return to its birthplace to spawn as do the Chinook and Steelhead. They had not been expected to migrate past the dam.

to that bill. What about electric heating? The "objective" rate schedule will allow 1500 kilowatt-hours of heating for \$7.50. This is equal to five of the popular-sized space heaters, burning continuously ten hours a day for a month. The Administrator pointed out that districts can bring the heating rate even below the $\frac{1}{2}$ figure by balancing it with an irrigation load during the summer.

Each district or city system retailing power at cost will follow the form of the objective schedule, the Administrator said, and will fix its rates according to a formula that will assure a sound, self-supporting utility. The accounting system will provide for payment of fixed and operating expenses, and such reason-

able taxes as may be imposed. Surplus funds may be used to reduce rates, extend district systems and pay off bonds more rapidly.
