Six Plead Guilty in Circuit Court

It was a busy day for Circuit Judge Fred W. Wilson and District Attorney John Baker when the Circuit Court tried six young men in the court rooms in the First National Bank Building.

Of the six men, charged with crimes of theft and forgery, three were first offenders. All six entered pleas of guilty. One penitentiary sentence to a star offender was meted out, and four paroles were granted by Judge Wilson. "I am not in favor of the parole system," Judge Wilson said. "Today I think I have granted more paroles than any other day I have been on the bench."

Edward Ray, 26, charged with passing four checks, each for \$11.63, was sentenced to the state penitentiary for a term not to exceed five years. He was convicted on a charge of forgery in Hood River October 8. Ray was one of the four who escaped from the local jail two weeks ago.

He had made his way to the Willamette Valley, where his wife and her folks persuaded him to give himself up to Hood River authorities. He was also accused of writing six more checks, passed by co-workers. Ray had served sentences in the Washington Training School, had been an inmate of Walla Walla penitentiary, and at one time had escaped from the Washington Monroe Reformatory. His record reads "Captured, paroled, returned, paroled, picked up on new charge, takes automobile, forgery," etc.

Harold Mason Hall, of Oregon City, was charged with entering the Hood River Consolidated Freight building on September 24. After committing the local crime he broke into a building at Oregon City and was sentenced there to two years in the penitentiary and paroled to an Oregon City attorney. Judge Wilson followed the same procedure in passing sentence. Hall now faces two sentences to the penitentiary—one from Oregon City and one from Hood River.

In the case of Frank T. Plummer, 22, from Oklahoma, accused of larceny of personal property in an admitted act of stealing two rings from a room in the Hood River Hotel, Judge Wilson deferred passing sentence until Plummer's record in Oklahoma and Washington, D. C., arrives. He had been sentenced and paroled in his home state after facing a charge of passing bad checks.

Jewell Cox, 19, of Salem and Theodore Henry Hoepfner, 18, of Lodi, Calif., accused along with Plummer for doping and robbing Joe Cozad of Hood River of \$2 in cash, were paroled to their parents. It was a first offense for these two. The three had left Hood River after their crimes on October 21 and had bought tickets to Lodi. Hoepfner's brother had heard a police radio broadcast describing the boys and Hoepfner's parents were instrumental in bringing them back to Hood River.

The case of John Quint, of Minnesota, in which he pleaded guilty to a charge of taking an automobile wheel and tires belonging to E. R. Pooley, resulted in him being paroled to H. F. Hollenbeck, after being sentenced to one year in the penitentiary. It was Quint's first offense, and it was pointed out that bad company had caused him to be involved in the theft. He was assessed court costs, to be paid in installments.

Judge Wilson pointed out before announcing the paroles the urgent need for an intermediate institution for such young men as were tried yesterday. Under the present setup, he stated, those over 18 years of age have to be sentenced to the penitentiary.

PLAN COMMUNITY AUCTIONS

Probability of starting a county-wide institution known as a Community Auction was announced this week by Glen Thomas, auctioneer, and Andrew Weinheimer of Odell. Under the plan a sale house would be selected and persons could buy and sell household goods, livestock, farm equipment, etc. Thomas announced that those desiring to make listings could contact him at Odell.
