

Windows Will Be Unveiled December 2nd

With new and different street decorations that promise to lend a colorful spectacle to the holiday atmosphere, and with a grand opening of Christmas displays, the Christmas shopping season will start intensively in Hood River a week from Friday.

A meeting was called of the merchants on Oak Street, Wednesday evening, November 16, at which time a proposal, submitted by a committee of the Chamber of Commerce, for new and different Christmas decorations on Oak Street was approved. These will be in place by November 30.

On Friday, December 2, all merchants will participate in Christmas window display. Show windows of Hood River stores will be unveiled at 5:30, at which time many surprises will be revealed, the committee stated.

The Chamber of Commerce has been cooperating with the Apple Growers Ass'n with their gift boxes of Hood River fruit. All merchants are asked to use as many gift box circulars as possible along with their out-of-town correspondence, remittances, orders, etc. Any merchants not already approached who can use some of these circulars are asked to contact Roy Buchheit at the Apple Growers Association or to apply at the Chamber of Commerce office for supplies.

National Grange

The National Grange Convention continuing until Nov. 24 still holds first place in Grange affairs.

On the opening day of the convention Louis J. Taber, National Grange master, outlined the Grange program as follows:

1. Give the American farmer the American market on all crops which he can efficiently produce.
2. Develop new markets and new uses for food and fibre products.
3. Maintain our share of the foreign markets on those commodities that we have long produced for export.
4. Set aside all tariff revenues on agricultural products to use as a drawback to aid in exporting farm products, or equalizing tariff costs.
5. Continue to increase appropriations for research laboratories.
6. Reduce production costs by keeping transportation, interest and other fixed charges at a reasonable level.
7. Check the continued increase of debt and taxes.
8. Develop a sound program that increases the forestry, wild life and conservation use of land. Retire marginal and sub-marginal land and bring no new acreage under cultivation until needed.
9. Increase support and assistance for cooperative marketing methods.
10. Continue adequate appropriations for agricultural education, experimentation, extension, 4-H Club work, vocational agriculture and rural school activities.
11. Hasten business recovery and increase purchasing power.

Mr. Taber has a keen understanding of the nation's agricultural problems in relation to world problems and deservedly represents a great group of American farmers.

The largest class west of Ohio was initiated into the 7th degree in The Auditorium on Friday, Nov. 18, when nearly 4,000 candidates received this highest degree of the order. At a similar initiation held in Portland during the last National Convention seventeen years ago a class of 1,200 received this degree. In all 105,506 Grangers have taken the degree.

President Roosevelt, a member of the order in Dutchess County, New York, for 25 years, received the degree at Rochester in 1930. Because he had another appointment at the time Grange officers offered to excuse him early, but Mr. Roosevelt, then governor of New York, said it was so beautiful he would not miss any part of it.

It was an experience to be cherished always by the thousands who witnessed the beautiful ritualistic work last Friday.
