

Early Days Recalled In Book Exhibit

Days of long ago were recalled in the exhibition of books for the past week at the Hood River County Library, in observance of National Book Week.

The oldest of the books were two Bibles, printed in German. One revealed the date 1703-1704 on the title page. It was three inches thick and about eight inches in length. The other Bible, much larger, was printed in 1742 and in a much larger type.

Other books and newspapers were on display, these owned by Mrs. Wait, librarian. She had them arranged in a "march of time" effect, from old Bibles to the latest in current events. On display were "Lady of the Manor," on the subject of confirmation, printed for "young females" in 1829 in Philadelphia; "A Third Reader," published in 1866; "Elementary History of the United States," 1873; a book on natural philosophy, printed in New York in 1874; a "Harper's Monthly," of July, 1855; a "St. Nicholas," of February, 1883; the "latest fashions" in "Harper's Bazaar" of the years 1874 and 1875.

Of illustrated newspapers there were Frank Leslie's Illustrated Newspaper, 1877, and the London Illustrated News of 1876. Also on display was a bound volume of "Harper's Weekly," 1877. Others were Biblical stories, Shakespeare's volumes, and an old Atlas to make up the march of time.

All of the specimens were in exceptionally good condition, considering their age.

Writers' Club Announces Classes in Creative Writing

The Writers' Club of Hood River has announced that Captain C. P. McCan will give a course this winter in short story writing, poetry and creative expression. Classes will commence on Tuesday, December 6, and will be held in the County Library Building.

The Writers' Club is an organization of many years standing in this valley, composed of talented writers, many of whom have received national acclaim in magazine and newspaper work.

Aschenbrenner, who majored in Philosophy in College and Bible at the Institute, is now the popular preacher in the Christian - Presbyterian - Methodist Federated Church at Prineville, Oregon. He is a forceful and inspiring pulpiteer. The public is invited to hear him. An offering to defray his traveling expenses will be taken only Sunday night, Dec. 3, and Wednesday, Dec. 7.

Wins Prize Three Consecutive Years

For the third consecutive year, Percy L. Manser, local artist, has received the Artists' Vote Prize in the Oregon Artists' Exhibition. Mr. Manser was given the award in Portland last Thursday when he and Mrs. Manser attended the society's monthly meeting. The prize is awarded on the basis of the vote of the exhibiting artists, and is awarded the exhibitor who contributes most to the success of the show.

Two paintings were shown in the exhibit held at the Meier & Frank galleries by the local artist—"Heavy Swell," a marine picture, and "The Copse," an autumn landscape.

The prize has been awarded for three years, and each year Mr. Manser has received the vote of the exhibitors and been awarded the

artist vote prize.

Local residents will have an opportunity to view Mr. Manser's paintings for a five-day period, beginning Friday of this week, when a display of his paintings may be seen at the Hackett Furniture Store in Hood River. In addition to showing his pictures, Mr. Manser has offered a door prize in the form of one of his popular landscapes. Others of his paintings will be on sale at the exhibit.

In recent years, numerous awards have been won by this local artist, who resides in the Belmont district. In addition to winning the artists' vote prize at Portland, he has been given awards at state and county fairs, and his work has been recognized at several eastern exhibits.
