Chamber Backs Wine Industry

Diverting the surplus fruit crop of the Pacific Northwest to wine and brandy plants will be one of the objectives of the Mid-Columbia chamber of commerce in the coming year, it was determined at the chamber's annual meeting held here Wednesday. A resolution, pointing to the loss sustained each year by fruit growers in C grade fruit returns and calling for the appointment of a committee to determine means of a wider use of this fruit in wine and brandy making, was passed at the meeting. Apples, pears, peaches, apricots, cherries, grapes and berries were mentioned as products which could be utilized in the wine plants to further this processing industry in the northwest and thus afford greater employment.

The committee which will be appointed to promote this industry was also instructed in the resolution to approach the RFC to help handle the Northwest wine and brandy making should private capital prove insufficient to adequately handle the utilization of surplus fruit.

Other resolutions passed at the chamber's annual meeting included a request to state and region planning boards that further extension of park and recreational areas in the Columbia Gorge along the water-front regions be opposed. The resolution explained that the chamber was desirous of securing heavy industrial use of Columbia River power, which, without transmission costs, and adjacent to water, rail and highway transportation, should prove advantageous to industry. The resolution asked that further development of parks in the Gorge be on the higher levels where major scenic attractions are found.

Another resolution called for asking each member of the delegation in congress from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and Montana to seek in securing additional federal funds so that a pilot plant may be constructed and operated at a suitable point in the Columbia River basin to se-

cure basic costs of reducing metallic magnesium from magnesite ores.

An additional resolution called for the state of Washington to establish an all-year water-grade highway from Patterson to Kennewick.

Cities Want Share Of Gasoline Tax Receipts

There were six Hood River persons attending the regional meeting last Saturday of the League of Oregon Cities, held in The Dalles. The gathering was called, with representatives from the Mid-Columbia cities attending, to consider a share for cities of liquor and gasoline taxes collected by the state. It was brought out in the meeting that since the public in general makes use of streets in the cities of the state, these cities should be allowed a share of the gasoline tax for street maintenance.

The gathering was addressed by Mrs. William Munroe, representative in the Oregon Legislature from Hood River County. She expressed herself as being in accord with the program of the League of Oregon Cities.

Attending from Hood River, in addition to Mrs. Munroe, were City Recorder Henry L. Howe, Mayor-elect Ray Samuel, City Attorney E. C. Smith, Councilman DeCaur Baldwin and Councilman-elect Arthur C. Johnson.

Household Hints

Table Decorations

There are many ways to decorate a table for Christmas and most of them are inexpensive. A center piece of pine cones piled carefully, yet not uniform, with sprigs of holly or pine bows as a border, topped off with tall white candles makes an attractive table.

A wooden bowl filled with fruits and banked with autumn leaves or to lay the fruit in a row down the middle of the table on a bed of holly.

Take a long loaf of sandwich bread, wrap it in cotton, put a candle in the middle and gradually slope candles of shorter size on both sides to the end of the loaf. The candles will hold due to the crust, but the easiest way is to remove the crust in order to be able to more easily stick the sprigs of holly over the top and sides. Thus the loaf is a bit of art. Lay holly around loaf as outline.

Gather ye sycamore balls on branches many—spray them with aluminum paint or dip them, and you have a decoration for Christmas and during the rest of the winter.

Kitchen Kinks

Use paper cups in preparing individual portions of frozen foods. Salads and desserts may then be served in the cases or unmolded, as you choose.

Biscuit dough, cut like doughnuts

and fried in deep fat, then rolled in sugar and cinnamon makes delicious quick doughnuts.

It is just as safe to keep canned food in the can it comes in, if the can is cool and covered, as it is to empty the food into another container. Cans and food are sterilized in the processing.
