

County 4-H Members Given Awards

Hood River County's second 4-H Club Achievement Day was held Saturday at the Legion Hall with approximately 300 present of the 350 boys and girls who have completed one or more projects.

C. D. Nickelsen, County Judge-Elect, told the 4-Hers what they could and did do in Hood River 60 years ago. It was apparent that those present liked to hear about the early days but also that present days were pretty good for boys and girls. Mr. Nickelsen commended them highly for their work and offered real encouragement for more and better work.

H. C. Seymour, State 4-H Club Leader, gave an inspiring talk on Oregon Club work and made the presentation of the \$100 Victor Radio, presented by the Radio Corporation of America, the Victor Co., and the Federal Extension Department, to the Parkdale Social Progress Club. The radio was received by the Leader and officers of the club with the entire group of 100 boys and girls gathered around. The officers are Harriet Monroe, President; Margaret Ballweber, Vice-president; Maxine Enney, Secretary; with Mrs. Martha Brunquist, Leader.

The Union Pacific Scholarship of \$100 was awarded to Harriet Monroe of Parkdale with Eleanor Brunquist also of Parkdale named as alternate. Harriet has done outstanding club work and leadership during the last eight years and climaxed her activity as president of the State Winning Social Progress Club. She has done much community work outside the 4-H Club program in Camp

Fire, Christian Endeavor and School activities. Harriet expects to use the Scholarship in her first year at Oregon State next fall.

Eleanor Brunquist as alternate has done an equal amount of Club work, has won more prizes in competition but has done less in Leadership outside of 4-H club work.

Other presentations were as follows: all in the form of full or half scholarships to 4-H Club Summer School in 1939.

Hood River Branch First National Bank of Portland—Everett Hawthorne, County Livestock Champion, winner of six firsts and second in Showmanship at the local 4-H Fair and a winner of 3rd place with his Leghorn chickens at the State Fair. Kenneth Packer—First in his Jersey Class and Junior winner of Showmanship at the County 4-H Fair.

Hood River Rotary Club, with Jim Carr making the presentation to Bill Alexander, County winner in Handicraft, who also won 4th place at the State Fair, and Eleanor Brunquist, County winner in Food Preservation. Hood River News—to Clinton Kile for Leadership. Clinton organized a dairy club of 10 members with eight completing.

Pomona Grange—to Paul Benedetti for leadership. Paul enrolled 9 members in a Garden Club and all completed. Their Crops judging team won second in the County 4-H Fair, competed at Pacific International Livestock Exposition and were placed third, although scoring higher than the Idaho team that placed second. younger girls completed 100% while Mary Helen herself completed four clubs and was active in several community projects including Music Chairman for the Social Progress Club. Hood River Garden Club, Presentation by Mrs. Walter Colby, President, to Louise Benedetti, member and leader of a 100% Flower Club which took first prize at the County Fair.

Hood River Business and Professional Women's Club, Presentation by Vienna Annala, to Genevieve Moore for Outstanding girls 4-H Club work in the County. Genevieve completed three projects, winning two firsts and one second and exhibiting at the State Fair. Pine Grove Grange, Presentation by Mrs.

J. M. Taylor to Robert Morell for Outstanding work in the Community. Robert completed Corn and Potato projects and was president of the Corn Club which had the winning crops judging team at the County 4-H Club Fair. Robert was also active in assisting and urging other club members to complete their projects. He was tied for third place in the corn judging contest at the State Corn Show.

Lunch for the entire group was served by the County Grange Home Economics group under the leadership of Mrs. J. M. Taylor. Boys and girls brought sandwiches, the Grange ladies supplied a hot meat dish, the Farm Bureau and Arden Farms, ice cream and a number of stores donated cookies, including Safeway, Hood River Market, Vincent-Shank and Gross' Cash and Carry.

The day was finished with the 4-H Club delegation filling the entire balcony at the Rialto Theatre as guests of A. S. Kolstad and his Rialto manager, Harry Weber.

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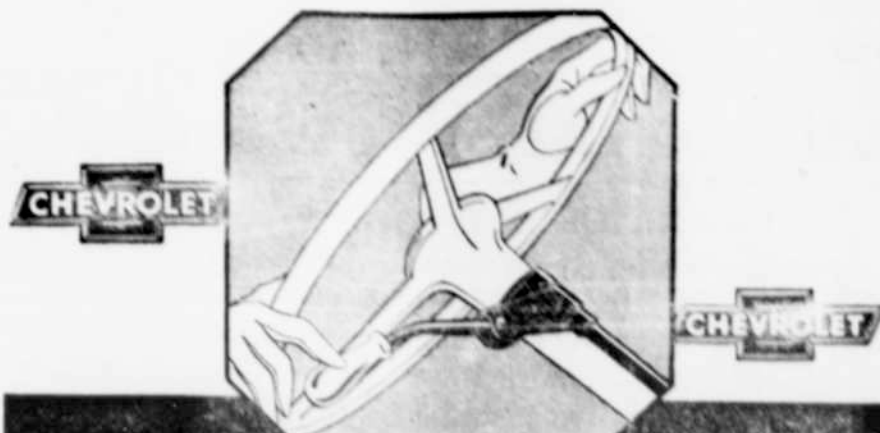
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Bids Opened on New Bonneville Power House

Bids were opened at Bonneville Friday by the Army Engineers for construction of the new addition to the powerhouse superstructure to house four additional generating units, according to announcement by Major Theron D. Weaver, District Engineer.

The work involves a reinforced concrete structure 328 feet long, 103 feet wide, and 72 feet high, which will be of the same design and architecture as the existing structure. Two generating units are already installed, two complete additional units are now under contract, and the structure will provide for two more units, a total of six units having a combined capacity of approximately 300,000 Kva.

L. H. Hoffman, of Portland, was low bidder on the superstructure, with a bid of \$1,169,596.10. Following is complete tabulation of all bids received:

L. H. Hoffman, Portland, \$1,169,596.10; Columbia Construction Co., Bonneville, \$1,677,965.00; Winston Bros. Co., Seattle, Wash., \$1,865,722.90; Government estimate, \$1,350,394.00.

Work on this job will continue over a period of about 20 months, and will give direct employment to approximately 250 men of various classes during the construction period, and indirectly to many more, as there will be over 2000 carloads of material entering into the structure.
