Bids Called for Valley Power Line

Erection of the 139-mile Bonneville power line from Vancouver to Eugene will be completed by September 1, Administrator J. D. Ross disclosed today.

The line will be completed simultaneously with the "backbone" circuit from the dam to the Vancouver substation, "Ampere," so that Bonneville power can be transmitted down the Willamette valley by mid-autumn. It will be marketed at a uniform rate of \$17.50 a kilowatt year everywhere along the line.

Specifications for the major Oregon line now are complete and bids will be called within the next few days, according to Charles E. Carey, principal construction engineer. The contract will require holes to be dug, poles to be erected and cross arms and guys to be placed, along with the installation of insulators and stringing of conductors.

Crosses Washington County The Vancouver-Eugene line crosses the Columbia river, just west of Vancouver, and then passes over the Oregon slough, the Columbia slough and the Willamette river. Running in a generally southern direction, it then traverses the highway about two miles west of Beaverton and intersects with the Oregon Electric railway right-of-way about two miles north of Wilsonville.

From Wilsonville the line follows the railway's right-of-way to the vicinity of Chemawa, north of Salem; then detours to the west around Salem where it again takes up the railway right-of-way at Sidney. It detours around Albany,

returning to the right-of-way at Pyrtle, continuing on into the vicinity of Eugene.

2400 Structures Needed

Bids have been called or closed for the furnishing of all materials to go into this line and will be on hand in time for the use of the contractors. Contractors will be required to erect the line with the following materials supplied by the Project: 2,759,500 feet of conductor cable; 51,000 10-inch suspension insulators; 4,302 wood poles, 30 to 90 feet in length; 200 tons of pole hardware, cross arms and miscellaneous fittings. Approximately 2400 structures will be erected in addition to the construction of fourteen steel towers across the Columbia and Willamette rivers and the Oregon and Columbia sloughs. These will come under another contract.

First 80 miles of right-of-way already have been secured by Administrator Ross' staff and work

will start on construction of this section within 10 days after the contract is awarded.

(Continued from Page One) homes until April 1. This additional period will give them time to secure new living quarters.

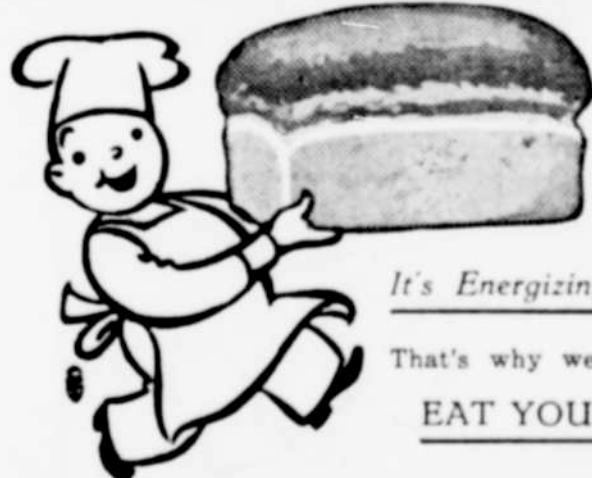
The court action affects 141 land owners and involves about 66 per cent of all the land in the Bonneville-Vancouver right-of-way, says Sherwood Jones, chief of the Bonneville Project land division, who has charge of appraisals and right-of-way negotiations.

All right-of-way affected by the suit lines in Clark County. Similar action in connection with acquirement of the Skamania county right-of-way was completed on December 20. Acquisition of this strip—nearly 40 miles long—will speed up delivery of power in the Portland-Vancouver area, as well as in the Willamette Valley and Western Washington.
