Utility Row Intensified

LINCOLN, Neb. — Negotiations for the issuance of \$23,000,000 worth of revenue bonds to finance a large Nebraska power deal have been abruptly suspended by Banc America Blair corporation of New York city due to a bill before the Nebraska legislature which threatens to permanently upset plans for a state-wide public power network.

The deal is the proposed purchase of the Iowa-Nebraska Light and Power company, a subsidiary of United Light and Power, for an appraised price of \$20,195,991. The sale figure, arrived at by Bonneville Dam Administrator J. D. Ross after R. W. Beck of Portland, a Ross subordinate, had made an intensive study, had been approved by the federal power commission.

The bill behind which the bond issue is stymied is a measure by Senator G. W. Craven of Lincoln, which would deprive the state's PWA-financed hydroelectric districts of their power to fix retail distribution rates on the power they generate.

Craven's bill, however, is not the only stumbling block. The Nebraska league of municipalities, which objected to the proposed sale, plans to introduce several bills next week which will further complicate matters. The municipalities want:

1. Power to tax the hydroelectric distribution facilities if they should be purchased.
2. Power to condemn and take over such distribution facilities as the hydros might purchase.
3. Local control of rates at which power will be distributed at retail.

Since the purchase permit granted by the federal power commission extends only to February 27, it will probably be necessary to get a time extension until the legislative situation is clarified.

DREDGING JOB STARTED

Another long step toward culmination of the upper Columbia river district's dream of deep-sea shipping was taken during the last two weeks when actual work on deepening the ship channel between Vancouver and Bonneville and the construction of necessary pile dikes was started by two contracting firms, under the general supervision of Major Theron D. Weaver, Bonneville district United States engineer, and his staff.

The big electric dredge Clackamas, rented by its owners, the Port of Portland, to General Construction company of Seattle, was cutting the channel to a depth of 15 feet and width of 300 feet at the foot of Government island, between Vancouver and Camas.

ting the channel to a depth of 15 feet and width of 300 feet at the foot of Government island, between Vancouver and Camas.

Meanwhile, Morrison - Knudsen company of Boise, Idaho, was assembling materials on the ground and getting ready to start construction of 32 pile dikes, the first of them to be built on Government island near where the dredge was working, in order that material taken from the river may be piled behind the dike.
