P. P. & L. REDUCES RATES

Salem on Tuesday by N. G. Wallace, Oregon public utilities commissioner, following an informal investigation in which the company cooperated with members of the commissioner's staff.

Total reductions put into effect in Oregon and Washington by the Pacific company since 1936 will be swelled to \$615,000 by the latest slash.

Residential rates here under the new schedule will be: First 15 kwh per month, \$1.00; next 25 kwh at 5 cents; next 120 kwh at 2 1/2 cents; excess at 2 cents. The second and third steps of the present rate call for 23 kwh at 6 cents and 112 kwh at 3 cents.

For automatic water heating service a special rate of 8/10 of a cent per kwh is already in effect.

Comparison of typical residential bills at the rates in effect three years ago, at present rates and at the new rates is as follows:

	25 kwh	50 kwh	100 kwh
1936	\$1.75	\$3.02	\$4.52
Present	1.60	2.74	4.24
New	1.50	2.52	3.90

The new commercial lighting schedule is: First 15 kwh per month, \$1.00; next 185 kwh at 5 cents; next 600 kwh at 4 1/2 cents; next 700 kwh at 3 cents; and excess at 2 cents.

The present commercial service rate is: First 15 kwh per month, \$1.00; next 185 kwh at 6 cents; next 400 kwh at 5 cents; next 400 kwh at 4 cents; next 1000 kwh at 3 cents; and excess at 2 cents.

How the new rates will effect commercial service bills is illustrated by the following examples:

Minor changes made in the general power service schedule will benefit small users of power.

Rural rates in the Hood River district will follow the downward trend of city rates.

The new rates will be applicable to all meter readings taken on or after March 1.

rushed to completion by Bonneville crews ahead of the power-navigation celebration last summer has been estimated variously at between \$10,000 and \$22,000, including step-down transformers.

The city has already spent about \$7000 for poles and floodlights within the city and for the time being has two sets of street lights, those belonging to West Coast and their own which use Bonneville power.

Meanwhile Cascade Locks' deal with West Coast for acquisition of the company's system for \$44,000 is moving sedately along toward consummation. The contract was signed December 13, the company came through with deed and conveyance requirements within the 30-day limit, and the city has until March 31 actually to produce the money and effect the transfer. In the interim it must obtain from the supreme court a ruling on the validity of the city's \$90,000 utility

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
