Household Hints

Add bluing to soap suds before washing glassware. This adds a luster to glasses.

To soft-cook eggs, put them in a pan of water that is boiling hot, remove from fire and let eggs stand from eight to ten minutes.

Metal teapots sometimes give a musty flavor to tea made in them. Prevent this by storing lump of sugar in pot and when ready to use the pot, rinse it in boiling water.

Salted meat requires longer boiling than fresh. Put it in cold water, quickly bring to a boil and then let it simmer.
