## Bids on Power Line Opened

Bids for construction of the backbone line of Bonneville dam to Vancouver were opened Tuesday for analysis.

The 220,000-volt, steel tower, twin circuit line, largest transmission job awarded by the Bonneville administration to date, will cost approximately \$500,000.

Work will probably start within 30 days, bring employment to several hundred residents of Washington areas by mid-autumn.

Many Sub-Contractors Will Handle Work

That much of the work will be handled by subcontractors has been made apparent by the fact that many firms obtained sets of the more than 100 maps and drawings

which set forth the specifications.

Bidders seeking contracts are: Fritz Ziebarth, Long Beach, \$349,491, low bidder.

Acme Construction company and Napage McKinny company, Seattle, \$446,486.

Eivind Anderson, Tacoma, \$502,404.

Power Builders, Inc., Portland, \$454,821.

Mirene company, Portland, \$672,366.

Oregon Construction company and Jacobsen-Jensen company, Portland, \$536,244.

Parker-Schramm company, Portland, \$488,781.

The Ziebarth company has handled contracts for Seattle City Light and the Metropolitan water district of Los Angeles.

Heaviest single cost item to be borne by the contractor will be the hauling of materials from depots provided by the Bonneville project to points along the 36-mile right of way which cuts through timbered hills north of the Columbia river.

Construction will include the erection of 374 steel towers and footings and the stringing of 219 miles of steel reinforced aluminum cable.

Bonneville engineers, under direction of Acting Administrator Charles E. Carey, have been working for months on the completion of surveys and specifications and on the purchase of materials in preparation for the construction program.
