

**SPECIAL PROSECUTOR TO BE APPOINTED**

Jury Session Postponed  
Hood River County's history-making grand jury session was postponed this week, after District Attorney John Baker sent a request to Governor Sprague to ask the Attorney General to appoint a special prosecutor for the term.

Baker explained that since he was legal counsel for the county offices and since these offices were on trial in the investigation of the rock crusher purchased by the commissioners last summer, that he felt he was not in a position to act in the case.

The session is expected to be history-making in that it is the first time that a three-day session of the grand jury has been anticipated. Also it will be the first time a woman has served on the grand jury in this county. Hildred Rhoades of Mount Hood was drawn as one of the jurors Monday. Others on the list are Chairman Allison Fletcher, Alva L. Day, J. B. Edington, H. R. McIsaac, John Plog and A. L. Paddock.

The jurors met Monday and adjourned in the afternoon. A short session will be called Thursday morning, then the jurors are expected to convene March 20.
